Agenda Item 3 is the Agency's recommendation for 8 the Class of 2014 Florida Veterans Hall of Fame. 9 Florida Veterans Hall of Fame recognizes and honors 10 those military veterans, who their works in life 11 during and after military service, have made a 12 significant contribution to the State of Florida 13 through civic, business, public service, or other 14 15 pursuits. During the March 10 Cabinet meeting, the Attorney 16 General stated her Office's review of applicable 17 statutes and guidelines could not currently support 18 inclusion of Florida pre-statehood veterans, where 19 those veterans were in the service of the Confederate 2.0 21 States of America. As a result, our Agency was directed to forward 2.2 23 to you for consideration the five hall of fame nominees initially presented by us at the February 5 24

Cabinet meeting in Tampa.

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Therefore, the Florida Department of Veterans 1 Affairs is pleased to forward the following 2 distinguished nominees for induction into the 2014 3 Class of the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame: The late Admiral Leroy Collins, Jr., United 5 States Navy Reserve. The late Admiral was a 6 submariner, business and community leader, and former 7 Executive Director of the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs. He died tragically one morning in 9 Tampa Bay while he was doing his morning PT routine 10 11 prior to going to the office; 12 Major General James Lee Dozier, United States Army. The General is a recipient of the Silver Star 13 for heroism and for Purple Heart for wounds that he 14 sustained while in service in Southeast Asia. 15 also a community leader, champion of Veterans causes, 16 and a former member of the Florida Commission of 17 18 Veterans Affair; 19 Colonel Frank Farmer, United States Army, Florida Army National Guard and United States Air Force 20 21 Reserve. Colonel Farmer received the Bronze Star for his 22

service in Vietnam. He then earned his medical degree, returned to military service as a doctor, and later served with distinction as the Surgeon General

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and Secretary of the Department of Health of the Great State of Florida;

Chief Master Sergeant Eugene Cecil Johnson,
United States Air Force. Chief Johnson is the first
enlisted member and first African-American nominee to
be recommended for inclusion in the Florida Veterans
Hall of Fame. He is a distinguished civic, education,
and veterans leader, who spent 20 years of service as
the Veterans coordinator for the South Brevard NAACP;

Lieutenant General Lawrence F. Snowden, United States Marine Corps. General Snowden is the highest ranking survivor who fought in the battle of Iwo Jima during World War II.

Following his 37 years of distinguished service, he became an international civic and business leader. He also assisted with establishing Florida Department of Elder Affairs, and serves as Chairman Ameritus of the Iwo Jima Association of the United States of America.

Before I request approval of these five nominees, there are two speakers who wish to make brief statements regarding the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame.

First up is Mr. Graham Smith, representing the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Good afternoon.

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MR. SMITH: Good afternoon, y'all. If I may approach y'all and give you a couple of handouts?

My name is Graham Fredrick Smith. I am an ancestor of both Confederate and Union soldiers who fought during the Civil War in the United States.

As a result of my Confederate ancestry, I am a member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans. Within the Florida division, I am the Chief of Heritage Operations.

In January, I retired from the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles after 33 years' service.

For the first 27 years, I was with the internal audit section of the Office of the Inspector General. For the final six years, I was with Florida Highway Patrol, responsible for the staff inspection program. Throughout my professional career, I analyzed federal and state laws, Florida Administrative Code Rules, Department and Division policies and procedures.

I performed these analyses to determine compliance with the directives by the audited unit or FHP troop. It didn't take long to realize that most often established laws, rules, policies and procedures are black and white; there is no gray area. Seldom is

1 there.

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With that knowledge and experience, I analyzed the statute pertaining to the Florida Veteran's Hall of Fame. In contrary to the advice and opinions you have received today, I determined that the laws established for the program are very clear and the legislative intent is unquestionable.

I will go through Florida Statute 265.003; that will be Exhibit 1, or EX that I've handed you, and explain the clarity of the law and legislative intent.

The first section 3A states, the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame is created within the Department of Veterans Affairs as an advisory council as defined in 20.037; that's Exhibit 2.

The definition states, "The council or advisory council means an advisory body, created by specific statutory enactment and appointed to function on a continuing basis for the study of problems arising in a specified functional or program area of state government," and it also provides recommendations and policies -- policy alternatives for those problems.

The first part of the sentence establishes the longevity of the council. The sentence goes on to detail the duty of the council "as studying problems and providing recommendations and alternatives."

Therefore, since there have been no problems with or in the program, the Hall of Fame Council had no need to make recommendations or policy alternatives to resolve problems.

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However, it can be said, but it hasn't yet, that a problem exists where pre-statehood and Confederate Veterans are excluded from the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame. By definition, this would have been a perfect problem to present to the Council so they could study it and make recommendations. Instead, y'all sitting as the Governor and Cabinet, want to return it to the Legislature for clarification without consulting the Council, consisting of members that each of you appointed.

Second, in light of the limited scope of duties of an advisory council, defined in 20.037, the Legislature delineated additional responsibilities of the Council, in stead, 265.003.

Section 4H states that the Council shall transmit a list of up to 20 nominees to the Department of Veterans Affairs for submission to the Governor and Cabinet, who will select the nominees to be inducted.

At the Cabinet meeting earlier this month, both you, Governor Scott and Commissioner Putnam, quiried the Veterans Affairs General Counsel on what statutory

authority was given to given to Director Prendergrast to exclude nominees prior to passing the list to you.

The general counsel responded that Statute 20.03, defining the advisory council, gave that authority. He said that the Council can only make recommendations to the director. That is the not the case and clearly the law has been misinterpreted.

However, if it was interpreted correctly, section 365.03, paren 4, would state that the Council "shall transmit a list of up to 20 recommendations," not nominations, "to the FDVA for consideration." Also, State Statutes state that FDVA will submit the Council's nominee to the Governor and Cabinet to select the nominees to be inducted.

By scrubbing this list, the director of FDVA performed your jobs. Further, after withdrawal of a list of nominees provided by the FDVA in 2011, legislation was passed in 2012 amending the original statute; in doing so, it created Florida Veterans Hall of Fame Council.

Chapter 201.215(9) Laws of Florida, which is
Exhibit 3 that I've given you, identifies the
legislative intent by stating in part an act amending
265.003, Florida Statutes, creating the Florida
Veterans Hall of Fame Council, providing for the

Florida Veterans Hall of Fame Council rather than the
Department of Veterans Affairs, and that is a quote,
to select nominees for induction into the Florida
Veterans Hall of Fame and to establish criteria for
the selection.

Third, section 265.003(5) states in part, "The Florida Veterans Hall of Fame Council may establish criteria for the process of selection of nominees for membership. Therefore, the Council is given total authority to establish the criteria to be used in this selection of nominees.

For obvious reasons, one set of guidelines or criteria can't be rubber-stamped on each Veterans' application being considered. Each one is unique. As you just heard. For instance, should a veteran's service during a given time period, the MOS, military accomplishments, service medals, et cetera, be considered or not considered. We just heard where some of the veterans being presented have had their service records as well as the medals they received mentioned; that decision must be left to the Council as each application is reviewed.

The Statute further states that the applicant will have made a significant contribution to the state in civic, business, public service or other pursuits.

This is another situation where one set of criteria

can't be used for all. The Council must be permitted,

as the Legislature has authorized, to establish the

guidelines as the need arises. Obviously, the Council

amended their established guidelines so it could

nominate three Florida Veterans of the Civil War.

Finally, regarding the definition of a Veteran.

There is none in Chapter 265, nor is there a reference in that chapter to any other definition in another chapter.

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The Florida Veterans Hall of Fame Council was created by the Florida Legislature in 2012. Its composition is seven honorably discharged Veterans; four of which are members of a Congressionally Chartered Veterans Service Organization. I'm certain this body of veterans has your, the State's, and all of Florida veterans' interest in mind.

The Council has performed its statutory obligation and each member has fulfilled his or her responsibility to their appointing authority -- that would be y'all. In something so, they forwarded eight nominees for your consideration of inclusion into the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame.

There is no need for legislative interpretation or clarification. The law is clear. All eight of the

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    nominees reported to you must be considered for
    induction at the same time. Now is the time to take
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    action on the Class of 2014. It has been delayed long
    enough -- four months to be exact -- and action should
    be taken today on all eight.

I have received a copy of your deputy -- this is addressed to Attorney General Bondi, because it's her staff that prepared the Attorney General's opinion that was presented to you.

I have received a copy of your Deputy Attorney

General Kent J. Perez's opinion regarding

qualifications of persons concerning including in the

Florida Veterans Hall of Fame, noting that the nominee

criteria expressed or created by the Florida Veterans

Hall of Fame Council would not currently support

inclusion of Florida pre-statehood or Veterans of the

Service of the State, of Confederate States of

America.

His opinion also states that the federal statutory language appears to be more restrictive than the state law, as it limits recognized military service to the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard. I also recognize that each Cabinet officer, the President, and the Speaker of the

House appointed a fully-qualified military Veteran to represent and serve on the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame Council.

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That Council nominated my great-great-grandfather, David Lang, to be your candidate for the Veterans Hall of Fame. He was placed in nomination because he was appointed Florida first Adjutant General of Florida troops in 1885 and remained such until 1894. This was a full-time position.

He also served as a close aide to Florida's next two governors. After learning that the Executive Director of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs have removed three names, nominees, from the list the Council recommended because they had Confederate Army service, I made an appointment to see Colonel Prendergrast the next morning.

In our discussion, he advised me he had removed Major General Lang's name, because he didn't have a copy of his honorable discharge, which was required by law, and I'm certain, however, that the records of the State of Florida can provide that list.

David Lang served honorably as Florida's first

Adjutant General, wore the uniform and federal

insignia that went with it. It was blue. It had the

federal shield. I presented the uniform to the

1 Florida National Guard some years ago and I have full 2 knowledge of it.

He was instrumental in obtaining changes in the militia law when the new Florida Constitution was adopted in 1885. Among key provisions were increased funding for training camps, United States Army, pay scales for military militant on active duty and tougher controls over militia units and summer encampment.

He was, as I said, a full-time Florida military officer. He was honored by Major General Ronald O'Harrison, Adjutant General in the State of Florida, at a Florida National Guard ceremony dedicating a historical monument at his grave site on 30 March, 1999.

Yes, David Lang had been a Confederate officer, as had the other two nominees, and they all served honorable. All contributed substantially to the State following the Civil War in significant capacities. In my opinion, all three have been -- should have been included in this year's nominees, and apparently so did the members of Veterans Hall of Fame Council.

However, if Deputy General Perez's opinion holds true, then maybe General David Lang should still qualify as a nominee to you for the Florida Veterans

Hall of Fame. He served as a full-time Major General 1 in Florida of troops in an active duty status, from 2 1885 to 1894, in a federally recognized position and 3 served as Florida's first Adjutant General, and is 4 known as the Father of the Florida National Guard. 5 He was a Veteran of Florida's post-war military, 6 serving honorably in that position, and he would still 7 qualify as a Veteran under your Attorney General's 8 opinion, despite the statement that nominee criteria would not currently support inclusion of Florida's 10 pre-statehood Veterans or Veterans in the Confederate 11 States of America. 12 Thank you very much, and I hope you'll take this 13 into consideration. 14 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Thank you very much. 15 Any questions? All right. 16 Thank you very much. 17 MR. PRENDERGRAST: Thank you, Mr. Smith and 18 Colonel Lang. 19 Our next speaker is Mr. Dale Landry, Regional 20 Vice-President of Florida State Conference of NAACP 21 branches. 22 Mr. Landry? 23 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Good afternoon. 24

MR. LANDRY: Good afternoon, Governor.

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Thank you, Colonel.

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Governor Scott, Attorney General Bondi, CFO
Atwater, Commissioner Putnam, on behalf of President
Adora Obi Nweze and the Florida State Conference of
the National Association for the Advancement of
Colored People, all of our units, members, and most
important our veterans, greeting and thanks for this
honor to address you on this most important issue.

Let me start off by saying that I agree that it is important to honor and remember those who have sacrificed and fought valiantly to defend and preserve the United States of America. The Florida Veterans Hall of Fame was designed to do this and has accomplished just that.

A recent proposal to induct three Civil War

Veterans: David Lang, Samuel Pasco, and Edward Perry,

has been a topic of many conversations and

controversy; however, one key point that many

seemingly fail to remember is the side these soldiers

fought for, the Confederacy.

These three men fought against the Union and symbolized a dark time in America in our state's history, a period full of hatred and slavery. It is important to recognize and remember that these men who took up arms against the United States of America and

killed or wounded members of the United States Armed 1 Forces; they absolutely should not be honored by 2 placement in the Florida Veterans Hall Of Fame, along 4 with those who have honorably served, wounded, and died, fighting against enemies of this United States, 5 in Europe, in the Pacific, in Asia, in South America, 6 in the Caribbean, the Mid East, and now again in our homeland, as depicted by those who have taken up arms 8 in support of terrorist extremists and attacked US 10 Armed Forces on military posts here in the United States of America. Again, all who like the 11 12 Confederacy took up arms against our service members of the United States Armed Forces in defense of our 13 14 great nation.

All three of these men went on to pursue admiral careers that reflected great service to our state and country's history: Lang was founder of the Florida National Guard, Pasco was a US Senator, and Perry was once Florida Governor.

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In these capacities, they have already left their legacies, but by inducting these men into Florida

Veterans Hall of Fame, is a bad message being sent; a message that the behaviors and belief they fought for are not only accepted, but honored, and that's just plain wrong.

More than 1.5 million qualified Veterans live in the state of Florida, the third largest population of Veterans in the country. These brave men and women have also put their lives on the line; the difference is, these veterans defended America's values for justice for all.

Furthermore, according to the criteria set forth for the induction into the Hall of Fame, these three men did not serve in the United States Armed Forces, and likewise, the United States military as depicted in the photos I provided you, making them ineligible for the Hall of Fame.

Sons of the Confederacy, a group comprised of those whose ancestors fought against the Union, disagree. They have a right to disagree, but they don't have a right to hijack this process that are their own interest. There should be no question as to what qualifies a Veteran for the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame.

The real question is what does the Hall of Fame represent. I believe that the Hall should celebrate the finest Floridians who served our great nation, these United States of America, with courage, skill and loyalty.

The Civil War ended 150 years ago, and we have

worked hard to rebuild our state and nation, but if you act to induct these three men into the Hall of Fame, you might as well also fly the Confederate flag over the State Capitol again.

In closing, I believe that both the law and common sense make it clear that Confederate soldiers and sailors should not be inducted into the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame. Taking such inappropriate action would be a kin to issuing a new declaration of Civil War. It would be an insult to our Veterans of Armed Forces and many Floridians, especially Native Americans, African-Americans, and Latinos, across our great state and great nation, who have served to defend these United States of America.

History has spoken, and members of the

Confederate Forces, just as other forces that have

fought against the United States of America and our

Armed Forces, do not belong in a Hall of Fame honoring

US Armed Forces service members.

That concludes my remarks, and thank you.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Thank you. Any questions?

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I have a question.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hold on just a second, ma'am.

24 | We have one question.

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COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I have a quick question for

you about David Lang, who, in addition to serving in 1 the Confederate States of America Army, also served US Army as Florida's first Adjutant General. So he's 3 someone who helped bind up the wounds from that war 4 and did serve the reunified United States of America. 5 Does he fall in a different category than those who 6 7 only served CSA? MR. LANDRY: Commissioner Putnam, and I have to 8 be honest with you. Again, as we in the NAACP, we 9 support what's right. With that knowledge that came 10 out about General Lang that he did serve in the United 11 States -- he served in the Florida National Guard as a 12 part of the United States Armed Forces -- I believe we 13 would have to support that induction, because he did 14 serve honorably under the blue uniform. 15 I've always found you to be COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: 16 17 fair and admirable, and I appreciate that. Council, it is called Florida Veterans Hall of Fame,

 - GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. I'm going to vote

against it just because -- I have no issue with David
Lang. I just haven't looked at his whole background,
So I'm not going to vote for it.

I'm going to vote against it only for that reason, and I have no problem in bringing it back up.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Can I just talk to my general counsel?

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Sure, sure.

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ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: I have -- this is nothing to do with the people involved. This has to do with what's legal, based on the Council's rule and based on what the Legislature has placed into law, and that's my job as Attorney General. Just so -- can I have a moment?

Okay. My general counsel says because of the National Guard service, we have the ability to add him. It may be challenged, and we may have to revisit it. At this time, no -- I mean, I think we're familiar with his background, and I have no problem at this time admitting him.

But again, you gentleman have to realize, it may be challenged, because there is confusion in the way the Council is structured and the law, and I again, am advising you that they need to clarify that.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: So the motion on the table has

been seconded, is that it would be the five members
that the Florida Veterans -- the five members of
Florida team has brought forward, plus the David Lang.
That's the motion on the table.

Did you have another?

MR. HERMAN: Governor, may we make one comment?

My name is David Herman; I'm general counsel for the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs, and I apologize. Emotions run high, and again, it's not about the people and it's about the law, and I've been asked to weigh in on the law.

Those who served the National Guard are not considered to be Veterans under the law, unless they served during a period of active where they were -- where the Guards were nationalized. Today, if National Guardsmen were to apply for service to be inducted into the Hall of Fame, they would not be eligible because they're not veterans, unless they served in active duty in the time of war.

So under that definition, regrettably, I don't believe that David Lang would qualify.

So the advice of 13 counsel is that unless there's evidence that David 14 Lang was called up on active duty, which we don't have 15 that in the record today, then he would not be 16 entitled to be inducted. 17 That is correct, Governor. MR. HERMAN: 18 19 MR. LANG: Would that include called up by the Governor of Florida? 20 2.1 MR. HERMAN: I don't believe so, sir. I'm sorry. MR. LANG: You don't think so? 2.2 GOVERNOR SCOTT: So the motion, still the motion 23 that we are on -- we heard all of the advice, but the

motion on the table is that it would be five members

PRENDERGRAST: We'll get that to you. 10 GOVERNOR SCOTT: If you can do that for all of 11 12 us. MR. PRENDERGRAST: Sure. We'll deliver that to 13 the staff. 14 15 GOVERNOR SCOTT: So I don't think we need to have 16 a motion on that; you'll bring it up. ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: That's fine. 17 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I'm sorry, go ahead. 18 CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER ATWATER: I just would --19 maybe all of this because now we've been back around 2.0 it several times. It might be our own Florida 21 National Guard. I just want to be sure, or when we 22 all come back and settle up on where this is going to 23 go or get Legislature -- or wherever this may go, I 24 just want to be sure that I understand your last 25

comment, sir, Colonel.

If somebody were to dedicate their life to the preparation and training of Florida, being prepared and ready for whatever we may be called upon in service in the country or to service one another in crisis; that an individual that has dedicated their life to that work as a member of the Florida National Guard, is precluded, notwithstanding whether they've worn that uniform to prepare troops, and gave everything and they had given, and lost their life in a catastrophic event they were helping to save the lives of fellow Floridians; is that person excluded because they were never part of active duty?

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Why don't you let your counsel answer that. That's your understanding of the law, right?

MR. HERMAN: Yes, sir. It's a question of eligibility for Veterans Benefits, and that's set by federal law which the State of Florida follows; is that the National Guardsmen, unless they're activated nationally are not considered veterans for national services.

CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER ATWATER: Then maybe for anyone listening, we're trying to thread a needle here, what -- I know we're trying to do this as

thoughtfully and as carefully as we can, and how the Council may be able to with its wisdom provide 2 nominees in the future. But I just would hope that we 3 don't find ourselves, for very different reasons than we've been discussing here today, that we're cornered 5 out of considering an application of someone or their 6 nomination of someone who again may have done a tremendous service in the uniform of this country but 8 technically didn't get through the eye of the needle 9 that someone else created as, this is one of needles 10 you need to get through. I just want to understand 11 them all. 12

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: And I believe that can be fixed.

CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER ATWATER: Okay.

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GOVERNOR SCOTT: Do you have another point?

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I do. The minutes of the Veterans Hall of Fame Council where these selections were made indicate that FDVA's general council, Dave Herman was present, and the deputy executive director of the agency was present by teleconference.

Now, throughout that long meeting, when they made these selections and six of the seven council members voted for at least one of the Veterans that have now been excluded, and five of the seven members voted for

two of the three veterans in their top ten, why didn't
either one of you say something in June of last year?

If you were so clear and so convinced that they were breaking the law in forwarding the name of Florida's first Adjutant General, who has his own memorial for his role in leading our National Guard and the namesake of a county, and a former governor, why didn't you say something when you had the Council together? Why did you waste their time if they were breaking the law?

MR. PRENDERGRAST: Commissioner, because I was here. The meeting was set during a Cabinet meeting. I was present here. I came at the very end of that meeting after the vote had been taken.

Additionally, the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs did not have a policy of reviewing the applications, going through them, screening them in any way before they went to the Council at that time. The Council, it was only after the Council had selected its list of nominees that the Department of Veterans Affairs became aware that it included nominees that were not eligible under the criteria in Florida law.

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So you pick and choose when you decide to engage in this process? I mean, you've

got a volunteer board that's dedicating their time to 1 sort through all of these worthy Floridians, and then 2 you didn't bring it to us until January of '15, after 3 they had made their first round of selections in June of '14. Did you ever let them know that you had taken 5 the position that three of their nominees were 6 illegal? 7 MR. PRENDERGRAST: Yes, sir, we did. 9 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Prior to our Cabinet meeting? 10 MR. PRENDERGRAST: Commissioner Putnam, that's 11 not a statement of fact. The Agency brought the list 12 13 of eight nominees to each of the respective offices of 14 the Cabinet members and the Governor's Office in August of 2014, and so informed them of the list of 15 nominees, and so informed them of the list of nominees 16 17 there was a problem with three nominees on the list. 18 In fact, that the Hall of Fame Council had ignored its own published guidelines for the proper nomination of 19 the individuals in the first place. 20 21 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: That's my point. You had someone in the room when they allegedly ignored their 22 23 own guidelines. Why didn't y'all speak up then? 24 There's no reflection in the minutes that you spoke up

in the meeting where the vote took place.

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MR. PRENDERGRAST: I was also at a Cabinet meeting at the same time. COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Your deputy was there. Your general counsel attended the end of the meeting. MR. PRENDERGRAST: I was not in the room, Commissioner Putnam, and I was here at the Cabinet meeting with all of you. My general counsel was here for most of the meeting, and the information was not provided to us until sometime in July. GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. Anything else? Anyone have any other questions? Thank you very much. ************* 2.2

FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS THIRD QUARTER REPORT January 1 – March 31, 2015

This report covers the activities of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs (FDVA) for the Third Quarter of the 2014-2015 Fiscal Year.

1. Administrative Highlights:

a. Current Issues/Concerns

Executive Direction: Executive Director Mike Prendergast continued his campaign of advocating with purpose and passion for Florida veterans and linking them to superior services, benefits, and support. Colonel Prendergast presented department overviews and updates on current federal and state legislative initiatives to veterans' groups, civic groups, and legislative committees. During this quarter he also met with local businesses and organizations to discuss outreach programs and projects to assist veterans. Colonel Prendergast served as the keynote speaker at the Citrus County Military Officers Association of America Luncheon in Crystal River and attended a Florida National Guard ceremony to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Camp Blanding Joint Training Center Museum and Memorial Gardens in Starke. He also attended the Change of Command Ceremony for the 53rd Infantry Brigade Combat Team at the C.W. Bill Young Armed Forces Reserve Center in Pinellas Park and attended the Military Order of the Purple Heart 10th Annual Ceremony in Crystal River. The ceremony commemorated the proud legacy of the Purple Heart and honored Florida's fallen heroes of the Global War on Terror.

New State Veterans' Nursing Home: Veteran Nursing home care delivery has experienced a significant change in philosophy of care, complexity of care, levels of service, length of stay, architecture, demographics of populations served, and new generational cohorts of residents requiring care that can only be provided in nursing homes. This has resulted in an initiative to transform the culture of nursing home care in the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs from a medical model where the care is driven by the medical diagnosis to a person-centered model where the care is driven by the needs of the individual, as impacted by medical conditions. In personalizing the delivery of care, the transformation of the culture of nursing home care challenges care providers to deinstitutionalize care and workplace practices. The Ardie R.Copas State Veterans' Nursing Home in Port St. Lucie (St. Lucie County) is in the initial planning stages and will be the first FDVA home to be reflective of these new changes. The 120-bed facility will offer skilled nursing care and will accommodate 60 residents with dementia/Alzheimer's disease.

Division of Benefits and Assistance:

Bureau of Veterans' Claims: Claims Services has adapted to recent VA paperless upgrades and mail as we know it is a thing of the past. All mail from Florida Veterans who correspond through the US Postal Service to the VA was moved from the VA Regional Office in St Petersburg to a scanning facility in Georgia. The mail is digitized, uploaded to the VA web-based mail portal for a VA employee to review, and forwarded to the appropriate team for processing. These new procedures were modified to provide quicker access to the mail and upload to the Veterans Benefits Management System (VBMS). VA employees now review the digitized file from any VA office. Claims Services has kept in step with the VA, making the transition appear seamless to Veterans we serve. This quarter, the office advocated for over 43,648 Veterans and their families and reviewed over 8.116 disability claims for disability benefits. The Claims Appeal Team represented 237 Veterans before Judges at the Board of Veteran Appeals, advocating for benefits sought. Additionally, the Claims Team attended 96 VA Personal Hearings scheduled to represent and assist veterans to present their cases to the VA Hearing Officer regarding proposal to reduce or retention of their benefits. The Veteran Claim Examiners worked with the VA to resolve 65% of the Personal Hearings in favor of the Veteran without the necessity of the Veteran traveling to the VA Regional Office.

Bureau of Field Services: Field Services provided 13 Veterans' Claim Examiners and 201 Man Hours to support the Governor's Veterans Service Award Ceremonies in Melbourne, Panama City and The Villages. The Bay Pines zone assisted Lee County Service Officers by providing a VCE to serve Veterans and their families while they were hiring new Service Officers. Field Services' David Austin, Harry Rudy and Ernie Kuykendall provided training at the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs Certification Course March 2-5. This quarter, Field Services attended 182 outreach events providing benefit information to 9,522 veterans and their families. Total Veterans served this quarter by Field Services is 66,616.

The Bureau of State Approving for Veterans' Education and Training (or State Approving Agency/SAA): State Approving Agency team members, Betsy Wickham and Katherine Snyder, were active providing legislative guidance this quarter. Public Law 113-146. The Veterans Access. Choice and Accountability Act of 2014. Section 702, requires all public Institutions of Higher Learning (IHL) to charge 'covered individuals' no more than the state resident rate for tuition and fees beginning July 2, 2015, or face disapproval of participation in Ch. 30 and Ch. 33 VA Education Benefits. Working closely with Florida Senate and House committee members, SB 7028 and HB 35 were drafted and have gone forward for committee review and consideration. In addition, Katherine Snyder, Florida Program Specialist and Chair of the National Association of State Approving Agencies' (NASAA) Flight Committee also provided input for HR 476. The GI Bill Education Quality Enhancement Act of 2015, a bill which is being reviewed by Congress and which addresses the role of SAAs, approval criteria and IHLs that have contracted with flight schools. SAA members presented information and fielded questions pertaining to aforementioned bills at the NASAA Mid-Winter Business Meeting in Washington, D.C., in February and at the Atlanta VA Regional Processing Office's School Certifying Official and VA/SAA Conference in Atlanta in March where over 800 school and VA/SAA officials were in attendance.

a. Quality of Care:

Panama City has been chosen for the Gold Seal Award which recognizes nursing homes that demonstrate the highest standards of quality of life and care for their residents. They will receive a new facility license with the Gold Seal Emblem as well as a certificate signed by Gov. Scott. The Gold Seal Award will be in effect from July 1, 2014 thru June 30, 2016.

The Gold Seal Award program was established in 2002 and developed and implemented by the Governor's Panel on Excellence in Long-Term Care, which is composed of persons appointed by the Governor's Office, Agency for Health Care Administration, Department of Health, Department of Elder Affairs, Florida Association of Homes for the Aging, Florida Health Care Association, Florida Life Care Residents Association and the State Long Term-Care Ombudsman. Nursing homes that wish to be considered for the Gold Seal Award are reviewed by the panel, which considers the criteria below and makes recommendations to the Governor. Gold Seal recipients must be in operation a minimum of 30 months prior to the date of application and the facility must:

- Meet a quality of care scoring and ranking that places them in the top 10 percent in their region or top 15 percent in the state and be a 5-star facility in the Nursing Home Guide
- Have no Class I or II deficiencies within 30 months preceding application
- Provide evidence of financial soundness and stability
- Participate in a consumer satisfaction process involving residents, family members and guardians
- Involve families and members of the community in the facility on a regular basis
- Have a stable workforce
- Have an outstanding record with the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Council within the 30 months preceding application
- Provide targeted in-service training to meet training needs identified.

b. Occupancy Trends:

The third quarter data confirms that census levels are greater than 98% for FDVA skilled nursing homes with the average occupancy for the State of Florida at 87%. Florida has the third highest population of veterans' in the United States. The U.S. Census Bureau data indicates that based on population figures, Florida has the highest number of elderly residents. This segment of the population will continue to increase because people born during the baby boom generation are beginning to retire. This trend of occupancy for FDVA nursing homes will likely continue as the State of Florida has a rapidly growing veteran population and the third largest population of disabled veterans in the nation.

c. State Veterans' Homes Program Renovations:

The Florida Department of Veterans Affairs (FDVA) received a grant under the State Veterans Homes Construction Grant Program to design and install a Safe Resident Handling and Transfer System to accommodate residents in all six State Veterans' Nursing Homes throughout the state. Facilities with ceiling lifts have shown a reduction in patient falls; a marked reduction in workers' comp injuries to nursing staff and a higher retention of nursing staff. The total project cost estimate is \$6,158,173.00; the federal funding's cost at 65% is \$4,002,812.45.

d. Volunteer Services:

There are a number of registered volunteers in the State Veterans' Homes that provide invaluable services for our veteran residents. The multitude of hours that are contributed add to the quality of life for the residents as well as allow the skilled employees to attend to more complicated, professional level tasks associated with resident care.
