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GOVERNOR SCOTT: Next I'd like to recognize
Mike Prendergast with the Department of Veterans
Affairs.

Good morning.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Good morning, Governor Scott, General Bondi, CFO Atwater, and Commissioner Putnam.

Before I begin our brief agenda this morning, I'd like to take a moment to highlight two important items for you: First, yesterday marked the 74th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor where more than 2,400 American lives were lost and the U.S. Navy's Pacific fleet was destroyed. We will remember forever the courage, selfless dedication, and the personal sacrifices made by the brave men and women of the armed forces during the Second World War.

Second, next Wednesday marks the 71st anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge, where approximately 600,000 American troops fought and overcame overwhelming odds to repel a major German offensive near the end of the Second World War. The battle resulted in 81,000 American casualties

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1 and approximately 19,000 American soldiers' deaths. It is equally appropriate that we honor 3 these brave patriots who sacrificed so much for our country. 5 Turning now to the agenda, the Department of 6 Veterans Affairs has three items for your 7 consideration today. Agenda Item 1 is the report 8 of the minutes of the November 10th, 2015, Cabinet meeting. We respectfully request approval. 10 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion on the 11 item? 12 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved. 13 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second? 14 CFO ATWATER: Second. 15 16 (NO RESPONSE).

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any comments or objections?

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hearing none, the motion carries.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you.

Agenda Item 2 is the Agency's second round presentation of Agency performance measures. At the suggestion of Commissioner Putnam and the members of the Cabinet, we took a good hard look at the objectives we presented in our earlier recommendations.

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We recommend the objectives remain unchanged for our proposed agency performance measures; however, we suggest modifications to the baseline numbers for performance measures 1 through 5 which now represent the median number for the data captured over the last ten years, meaning fiscal years '05/'06 through fiscal year '14/'15.

We believe the median is a far better figure and representative number than the mean. The mean can be affected by a one-figure outlier, but the median is less volatile when there is a disparity in the data. And this is critically important in consideration of the Nehmer claims that resulted in a huge spike in our claims processing and the number of veterans who came in through our doors to visit us at the Agency. And we believe that once these Nehmer claims settle out, we'll come back closer to what the true median number represents.

So for Performance Measure Number 1, retroactive compensation, we recommend 125,510,000 as the baseline number.

For Performance Measure Number 2, issue resolution, we recommend 42,767,000 as the baseline number.

And, Commissioner Putnam, in response to your

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question that came up during the last Cabinet meeting, we rated issue resolution at 7.5% of the total because the bulk of our workload in the Bureau of Veterans Benefits and Assistance is claims in general. And issue resolution, although critically important because it provides wheelchairs, glasses, hearing aides, walkers, crutches, canes, leg braces, et cetera, to our veterans, it is just one aspect of the overall claims process.

Performance Measure Number 3, the number of veterans served, we recommend 102,000 as the baseline number.

For Performance Measure Number 4, the number of claims processed, we recommend 27,521 as the baseline number.

And for Performance Measure Number 5, the number of services to veterans, we recommend 552,561 as the baseline number going forward for this year.

Would you like for me to go over the other performance measures as well even though there were no changes made?

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. So let's just -- let me just confirm something. What we presented in

23	first of all, thank you for taking into			
24	consideration the conversation that we had in the			
25	last Cabinet meeting. My concern, and particularly			

as it juxtaposes with the conversation we just had with Judge Cohen, you still have three out of your five performance measures that are north of 110% before we ever start measuring. So I worry about the fact that we're setting the bar too low, or that we are assigning the wrong weight to things that aren't as dictated by your control but rather by D.C.

So for example, you assign a weight of 10% to retroactive compensation, which is almost totally dictated by the U.S. Department of Veterans

Affairs; whereas, Measures 2 and 8, for example, are almost wholly within the power of the Florida

Department of Veterans Affairs, but we've reduced their weight to the lowest of any of them.

So I guess I have -- I still have the concern that, you know, we're setting -- that we're -- that when we're setting an objective, we're already at 110%, 115%, and 112%. But I also recognize that, you know, that that's sort of a function of managing the money that comes from D.C.

But I would -- you know, so I put that out there, you know, and I'm not going to -- I mean I've kind of made my point on that, and I'll let it lie. But I guess I would suggest that perhaps we

could accommodate the concerns about weighing those things that are most in control of your Agency by raising their weight and perhaps lowering the weight of those things that are more out of your control and determined by Congress and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

I throw that out as a suggestion. I know it's the -- I know that this is an ongoing process; I know that we're at the end of the year; I know that, you know, this is the second time we've seen this. So I put it out there for the -- you know, for everybody to chew on, and I'm not -- and if we adopt it as is, it is what it is.

But when I'm reviewing this, I will be looking at those things more heavily -- I will personally be more heavily weighing those items like 2 and 8 that are within the total control of Florida versus more heavily weighing those things that are not, and just kind of leave it at that. I think that the measures that have been selected certainly do give us a good picture of the performance of your agency, which is the -- at the end of the day, the real purpose of this.

And so I don't want to gag on a gnat, but I do, you know, just kind of scratch my head at

starting out with a performance measure where three out of the five of them are not just north of a hundred percent, they're north of 110%. So I've said my piece.

CFO ATWATER: Governor.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Wait just a second. CFO, you wanted to add something?

CFO ATWATER: I do. The Commissioner I think is right on the point here. We are in the process of trying to get all of these right. I would hope we don't take a motion on this one today.

Colonel, I appreciate your efforts. I think you've got the right measures, or I think these are very good measures; but, boy, as an employee, I would have loved to have been able to use the median for the last 10 years running with population growth on the move that you're going to clear all of these.

I just don't think we've got -- I think we're in the process of getting better at this, I just don't think these -- I don't think the measure is the right measure, but I do think that the objectives are the right objectives.

So I may be where the Commissioner is. I just, I don't -- I couldn't in good faith vote on a

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measure that by the sheer growth of the Florida population, and this population in particular, that that's really a measure. Are we getting better at finding those who need our services and getting to them? And then I know that's what you're about everyday and that's what your goal is everyday, I just don't think this is the right measure.

So I would certainly commit to you if we don't go forward with it today, to sit down, one-on-one time and talk about ideas and how else -- again, not that we'd make that decision solely, but just to offer some thoughts.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Mike.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Well, you bring up some interesting points, both

Commissioner Putnam and CFO Atwater. We know that the nation has been at war for more than 14 years now. We also know that there has been an unprecedented spike in the number of veterans processing through and receiving claims for disability and other compensation.

In the last five years, VA's disability compensation workload across the nation has risen by 101%, which is heretofore unseen data across the spectrum that's out there. So trying to nail down

the specifics of what measure is effective now is a very soft target that's moving constantly.

In addition, the military downsizing has begun in earnest, and we know that, and we're seeing more and more folks coming back home.

There has also been a surge in VA outreach both before our veterans ever leave the armed forces, which leads to benefits delivery at discharge, which as the GWOT veterans and the post-GWOT veterans actually access or earn benefits, we're not seeing some of those numbers coming through our offices in the first place because those benefits will start the day that that veteran separates from the armed forces.

So we're not even capturing those folks that are mustering out at the tune of approximately 20 to 30,000 a year, and maybe even more coming back down to Florida. So that's kind of -- it's a soft and hard target to get our hands wrapped around.

Also, over the last 40-year period, prior to the start of the GWOT, we had an average of 8.5% of the total percentage of veterans who had mustered out of the armed forces receiving compensation.

Since the GWOT commenced, 14 years plus ago, the increase has gone up by a hundred plus percent at

19% of the total veteran population today. And that -- trying to get some normalization of those numbers out there is, again, a very difficult target to put our heads around.

As I've mentioned in previous discussions, but I think it bears noting again, especially in light of us talking earlier about the Battle of the Bulge and Pearl Harbor, World War II veterans experienced a rate of approximately -- 11% of those veterans sought some type of VA compensation. And on average, their service-connected issues was about 2.5 issues per veteran from that era.

Well, if you fast forward through the Vietnam era, it was about 20% of those veterans and about 3.8 service-connected issues that they manifested upon their separation. Go all the way up to today to the contemporary veterans who are separating today, and 99% of them are enrolling in benefits delivery at discharge, which means that our work has -- a lot of it had already been accomplished before they ever crossed the threshold of an FDVA door for services.

They're averaging 16.2 items when they present for a claim, and 11.6 of those items are service-connected issues that they're coming in to

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see us for.

So the complexity of the claims grows this way, but perhaps the volume that we're going to see —— we project that we're going to see an even greater decline. Even though we're seeing an increase in our state's population in the veteran community, there's a potential for a greater decline in the amount of veterans we ultimately get to serve and the number of services that we provide to veterans.

Further, we also pulled and deployed this summer, in the August time frame, a new software system to manage all of the reporting that we do on our veterans services and capture the dollars and the issues that we resolved. And as that software matures and the employees across our Agency become more familiar with it, we'll have a better grasp on the ability to capture real raw data and then do an interpretation of what that data truly means to us going forward.

And perhaps then we'll come back to you, and it won't be the median that we use, we'll have some hard and fast numbers, once we can normalize out some of those other things that we've noticed out there in the data sets today.

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So I think it's a good starting point, it may not be a perfect starting point for us; but I would like to work with both of your offices to see if we can come up with a better solution.

And, Commissioner, you're spot on, we're all working to truly grasp the totality of the great work that our employees are doing for this awesome constituency. And I think it is important that we continue the dialogue to ensure that we get this right, because we want it to be more meaningful; but more importantly at the end of the day, we want our employees to hold their heads high at truly achieving some significant milestones of great import to the community that they volunteered to step forward and serve, like all of you have volunteered to serve in your positions.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. So is the recommendation that we withdraw this and Mike come back and talk to each of the offices and we take this up at the next Cabinet meeting?

CFO ATWATER: That would be my preference, Governor.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. So I'll make -Commissioner, is that --

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Uh-huh.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. So I'll make a motion that we withdraw the item at this time and it will come up at the next -- Mike will come up and meet with each of the Cabinet agencies, and then we'll bring this back up at the next meeting.

Is there a second?

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Second.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any comments or objections? (NO RESPONSE).

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hearing none, that motion carries.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you, Governor.

Agenda Item 3 is the Agency's annual report. Our third and final agenda item today is the submission and approval of the fiscal year '14/'15 annual report for the Department of Veterans Affairs. The annual report showcases the dedication, commitment, and hard work of our stellar team of steadfast VA professionals and the unparalleled support we receive from our strategic partners across the state, like our county veteran services offices and our congressionally chartered veteran service organizations.

As I look back on the events of 2015, I am

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especially proud of our state's efforts to commemorate the 70th anniversary of the end of World War II. During the war, 16 million Americans served in uniform, including 248,000 from Florida. Many more Floridians served on the home front from shipyards to factories to local United Service Organizations on the home front.

We partnered this year in an initiative called Victory Florida to honor the selfless service of the nearly 100,000 World War II veterans who currently reside in the Sunshine state. We were happy to participate and add our Agency's contribution to this historic narrative of the period.

The State of Florida in 1945 recognized the need to provide services to returning service members and created a division within state government to connect our veterans with their earned federal and state benefits. To better veterans and their families, Florida voters in 1988 overwhelmingly approved a constitutional amendment to create a cabinet agency to honor those who served us.

Today, the Florida Department of Veterans

Affairs is the premiere point of entry for Florida

veterans to access services, benefits, and support for those richly deserved opportunities to reintegrate themselves into their community.

We serve the nation's third largest population with more than 1.5 million veterans. FDVA plays a significant role in the direct infusion of more than \$15.7 billion annually for Florida's veterans into our economy through federal compensation; education; and pension benefits; and, of course, U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs medical services and military retired pay.

We believe increasing the quality of life for our veterans and their families through superior services, benefits, and support is the noblest of calling for our colleagues. Florida offers unique benefits such as in-state tuition rates for veterans and their families using the post-911 GI bill; several layers of property tax exemptions; expanded veterans preference; and extensive benefits, licensure, and fee waivers for many activities and occupations.

Let us never forget our veterans, their families, and their survivors, through whose selfless service and sacrifice we enjoy freedom and liberty. As always, we honor their service.

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beauty that Florida has to offer by canoeing; hiking; backpacking; and, of course, hunting and fishing.



# Ardie R. Copas Nursing Home Historical Timeline

- Nov 2011: FDVA applies for four USDVA grants of \$36M to build four conventional State Veterans' Nursing Homes (SVNH) in Florida
- June 2012: USDVA published updated Community Living Guidance for new Nursing Home Construction
- <u>Feb 2014</u>: FDVA underwent its legislatively mandate site selection process to select the next SVNH in Florida to be built
- Jul 2014: Legislature approves initial funding for design/build of SVNH #7 and design meetings begin
- Aug 2014: Governor and Cabinet approved Port St. Lucie as the next location for SVNH #7 (Ardie R. Copas SVNH)
- Dec 2015: Secretary USDVA approves conditional grant for Port St. Lucie
   Home
- Mar 2016: Letter to VA Secretary requesting relief/waiver for CLC
   requirements

### Current Situation (1 of 2)

- FDVA, DMS, and subcontractors working with USDVA on design modifications to better align cost and requirements.
  - Community Living Center vs. Conventional State Veterans' Nursing Home
  - USDVA Community Living Center Guidance released one year later
- Design Guide a distinct and financially significant departure from the structures the
   State of Florida understood it would build upon approval of its grant applications.
- CLC Design Guide specifically states "This volume is meant to be a guide, not a code or regulation."
- FDVA analysis has revealed that the CLC Design Guide standards pose significant human resource, financial and fiscal challenges for states that have previously submitted grants for nursing homes.



#### Current Situation (2 of 2)

- The Project Team (DMS/FDVA/RLF Architects/OHL Arellano Construction) have assessed construction cost and overall project budget based on current market conditions, codes, standards and program requirements
- Overall project cost for a CLC in Florida in 2016 is estimated at approximately \$58M versus \$39M (authorized grant amount)
- 3 March 2016: Sent letter to VA Secretary Robert McDonald requesting he waive guideline parameters or provide additional funding to pay for the increased cost associated with CLC Design Guide

- > 2016 construction cost escalation over 2011 construction costs (\$225-\$250 per SF versus \$325-\$350 per SF)
- ➤ USDVA Design Model Change (Increased Area by 41,500 SF)


#### **Description of Property:**

# Lake Baldwin CLC Historical Timeline

- 1999 2013: Facility operated as Community Living Center (CLC)
- Aug 2011: FDVA alerted to possible availability of a property in Orlando being vacated by USDVA for possible Nursing Home use
- Mar 2012: FDVA visits Lake Baldwin facility and discusses possible transfer of property and tours facility
- 2013 pres.: Facility retrofitted and being used as clinical, administrative office, and storage space
- Feb 2015: Congressman Mica, introduces bill to transition Lake
   Baldwin CLC to State of Florida
- Feb 2016: President signs bill to transfer Lake Baldwin CLC to State of Florida/FDVA
- Mar 2016: Ceremony with Congressman Mica, FDVA, and USDVA to announce transfer property and tour facility

#### **Current Situation**

- Mar 2016: FDVA and USDVA (Orlando VA Medical Center Team) working joint transition plan which includes but is not limited to:
  - Brief Governor and Cabinet and the Legislature
  - Property donation to the Internal Improvement Trust Fund, State of Florida
  - VA grant submissions and LBR requests for repairs and equipment
    - On site kitchen and laundry
  - Memorandum of Understanding/Agreement for support/services
  - Facility reconfiguration and furnishing
  - Facility staffing recruitment and procurement contracts
  - Inspections and certifications
- Mar 2016: Assessing facility transition costs




## **Way Ahead**

- Governor and Cabinet approval of property to present to TIITF
- Secure funding for facility transition operations (repairs, outfitting, staffing, kitchen & laundry)
- Begin retrofitting building space from office to residential living space
  - Punch list (\$5-7K per room)
  - Kitchen and laundry facility procurement (cost??)
- Request waivers from USDVA on some VA MEP requirements, including, but not limited to:
  - Secure VA waivers to continue double occupancy rooms
  - Secure VA per diem approval
- Request VA Grant Increase due to CLC requirements and escalation in project cost since grant submission
