#### DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: At this time I would like to recognize Mike Prendergast with the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Colonel.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: I brought a few props for this morning's Cabinet meeting with us.

Good morning, General Bondi, CFO Atwater, and Commissioner Putnam. I'd like to give you an update on the great work that our Florida Veteran's Foundation has been doing with an agency called Support the Troops. It's a Wesley Chapel organization that we've introduced to you in previous Cabinet meetings; and, in fact, their Executive Director, Mr. Mark Van Trees, was honored by the Governor and Cabinet during the November Cabinet meeting that we held down here right after Veterans Day.

Leading up to the holidays, Support the Troops put together a wide range of donations for our veterans in our state veterans domiciliary located in Lake City: Girl Scout cookies like you see in the box here, packages of socks for veteran

residents, and a whole host of other things, like personal hygiene items and clothing for our residents, were all provided by donations from Support the Troops and other organizations from across the state.

The Activities Director, Diana, received an overwhelming response and a lot of thanks and gratitude from the veteran residents of the veterans domiciliary. And, in fact, one of the comments that she related back to Naomi just yesterday was that our veterans came to them and told them that this was one of the best Christmases that they could ever remember and, indeed, the Christmas was so good it compared to Christmases they had with their own children whenever they were raising their families.

So they were very thankful for Mark and our Florida Veterans Foundation for all of the support over the holiday season, and we just wanted to thank them again for everything that they do for our veteran community here in the state.

Most recently, Support the Troops has facilitated the donation of more than a quarter of a million dollars of items for the Florida Veterans Foundation to use for upcoming homeless veterans

stand-downs. Items such as these long-term shelf-life meals, backpacks, other items of clothing, and personal hygiene items have been donated and will be donated again in 2015 as our homeless veterans stand-downs take root across the state. And, in fact, I think our chairman of our Foundation is here with us today, Colonel Retired Washington Sanchez from the Foundation, as he is at every Cabinet meeting.

We sincerely appreciate all that Support the Troops and the Florida Veterans Foundation do for all of our veterans, their family members, and survivors. And quite simply, we couldn't do the job that we do to the standards of excellence without their support, assistance, and the love that they provide to our veterans and their family members.

Before we begin our agenda, I have one additional brief but notable update for you regarding our State Veterans Homes Program. As you know, St. Lucie County was awarded the site for the seventh state veterans nursing home following a unanimous vote at the September 23rd Cabinet meeting.

Following the vote, we invited the

general public to participate in the naming process by suggesting eligible nominees for consideration.

Our naming protocols state that a nominee must be a deceased medal of honor recipient accredited to Florida by the Congressional Medal of Honor Society.

We received an overwhelming response for a Viet Nam War veteran: Ft. Pierce and St. Lucie County native, Sergeant Ardie R. Copas. Then a specialist, Ardie Copas distinguished himself on May 12th, 1970, while serving as a machine gunner in Cambodia.

When his convoy was ambushed, the 19-year-old specialist repelled the enemy under heavy fire, holding his post, while his wounded comrades were evacuated to safety. He was, unfortunately, killed in action and posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroic actions on March 18th, 2014.

We are honored to have here with us today, the daughter of Sergeant Copas,

Ms. Sharelle Copas-Herrera, who accepted our nation's highest military honor on behalf of her late father from President Obama last year.

Sharelle traveled down to Tallahassee from Tennessee to deliver a few brief remarks to you

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this morning. Please join me in welcoming

Ms. Sharelle Copas-Herrera to the Cabinet meeting.

(APPLAUSE).

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Good morning.

MS. COPAS-HERRERA: Good morning. I'd like to thank everyone for letting me and my mother be here today, and I'd also like to thank everyone who has been involved with everything that has happened thus far with my dad in honoring his sacrifice that he made that day for myself, my mom, my family, his buddies that day, and our country.

I'm so very proud of him, and words just can't describe the feelings that I've had ever since this has happened. I wondered so many years, my whole life, why he didn't receive this medal a long time ago.

After reading my dad's citations of his medals that were placed in my arms in my 30s, everything that had been told to me my whole life about my dad just came rushing from the top of my head to the bottom of my toes. You can be told things your whole life, but until you actually experience and see it for your own eyes, like I said, just — there's nothing like it.

And I've been extremely honored, and very

honored even more so about this nursing home being named in my dad's honor, for the fact that when I was a little girl I used to go to nursing homes and sing at the nursing homes. And at one time I even got to meet one of the oldest living relatives — oldest living Floridians at the time. She was 112 or 113, 14 I think, and that was just very impressive to me. And this past holiday, my first granddaughter, Hannah Renee Garrett, she went to the nursing home this year, kindergarten, and sang, and she loved it.

And just -- my mom, only being 17 when I was born, obviously my grandma had a big hand in raising me, my grandmom and my grandpa. So this nursing home is even better to me in my heart than even a veterans hospital because the elderly are so dear to me. And obviously veterans, because of my dad and what my dad did that day, veterans always have been a special part in my heart. And I just thank everyone so very much for everything you've all done for us.

Thank you.

(APPLAUSE).

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Good morning. I think

Caroline is going to come back in a few minutes and

we'll get a picture. The photographer is going to 1 come back in a minute. 3 MRS. COPAS: Thank you. 4 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Thank you. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you, 5 again, ladies, for attending today's Cabinet 6 7 meeting. Governor, the Department of Veterans Affairs 8 9 has five agenda items for the Cabinet's 10 consideration today. Agenda Item 1 consists of the 11 Cabinet meeting minutes for the September 23rd, 12 2014, Cabinet meeting. 13 We respectfully request approval of these 14 minutes. 15 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to approve? 16 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So moved. 17 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second? 18 CFO ATWATER: Second. 19 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Moved and seconded, show the 20 minutes approved without objection. 21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you. 22 Agenda Item 2 is the Agency's annual report 23 for fiscal year 2013 and 2014. Each of your offices received a copy of this report prior to the 24 25 holidays, and we would be pleased to review it with

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you in further detail if you have any questions.

Briefly, I'd just like to talk about a couple of the highlights from this year's annual report. The Agency supported 18 Governor's Veteran Service Award ceremonies last year, along with a number of presentations at Cabinet meetings held here in Tallahassee and throughout the state. Governor Scott honored nearly 5,500 veterans with this well-deserved recognition, and we look forward to the first ceremony for 2015 later this week in Melbourne.

Fifty VA state veterans nursing homes enjoyed an overall occupancy rate of 97.8 percent for the year with our standard being at 90 percent. percentages include our assisted living facility in Lake City which operates at a slightly lower percentage for its occupancy. Our six state veterans nursing homes again maintained an average occupancy of 99 percent last year.

Further, I'm pleased to note that we now have five of our six state veterans nursing homes rated at the five-star ranking by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. And our final home is a four-star home striving daily to try and achieve that five-star ranking.

Finally, our Benefits and Assistance Division 1 provided over 620,000 services to veterans, their 2 3 family members, and their survivors last year, and served over 110,000 unique veterans. This hard 4 5 work from our 99 veterans claims examiners 6 throughout the state under the leadership of Ms. Eileen Tarter, our Division Director, resulted 7 8 in more than \$174 million in retroactive 9 compensation awarded to veterans, and a return on investment of \$128 of earned federal benefits 10 11 flowing into Florida's economy for every dollar invested. 12 13 We respectfully request approval of our annual 14 report. 15 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to accept 16 the report? 17 CFO ATWATER: So moved. 18 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second? 19 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Second. 20 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any objections? 21 (NO RESPONSE). 22 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hearing none, the motion 23 carries. 24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you, 25 Governor.

Agenda Item 3 is the legislative budget request for fiscal year '15 and '16. I'd like to highlight a couple of the key issues within each division of the agency, but we've provided great detail to the staffs and, as well, to the Office of Policy and Budget upstairs.

Priority 1A is our homes improvement and renovation grants request. The Department has been approved for two federal matching-fund grants to increase the safety and security of our residents in two of our homes. Examples to meet these needs include new beds, required medical equipment and safety equipment, and other items to support the health, safety, and well being of our veteran residents.

The grants are, again, a cost-sharing program, with the federal government paying 65 percent, and our State Veterans Trust Fund paying the remaining 35 percent. These two grants total \$11 million.

And our Priority 1B project is our capital improvement program which the Department requests approximately \$2 million in our state trust funds to maintain and repair the remainder of our state veterans nursing homes. There are several other highlights throughout the budget, but I'd like to

turn now to the veterans -- the Division of Veterans Benefits and Assistance.

This great team over there does an awesome job, and a couple of years ago, due to our fiscal constraints, we used some of our trust fund money out of our operations and maintenance account to pay for some full-time equivalents to fund our requirements to help deliver veterans' benefits and services. We'd ask that this budget cycle consider removing that money from the trust fund account and putting it back into general revenue where traditionally it has been in the past.

And finally, for our Division of Executive
Direction and Support, we seek funding for our
Bureau of Information and Research in order to
allow the agency to do the in-depth analytics and
forecasting required to prepare us for the
challenges of our next generation of veterans that
are returning home on a daily basis. And we would
like to meet those requirements well ahead of their
demand landing squarely in the Agency's hands to be
executed.

Subject to your questions, we respectfully request approval of our legislative budget request for 2015 and 2016.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to accept the legislative budget request?

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?

CFO ATWATER: Second.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Florida law requires the Governor to independently submit budget proposals; accordingly, I am abstaining from the vote on this item. The record should reflect my abstention.

Any objections to accepting the legislative budget request?

(NO RESPONSE).

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hearing none, the motion is approved with one abstention.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you, Governor.

Agenda Item 4 consists of the Agency proposals for 2015 and, at the high level, Agenda Item 1 for this proposal is in-state tuition for dependents using the post 911 GI Bill. Item 2 is the veterans Employment Opportunity Act; and Item 3 adds some license plates to the license plates available for veterans and increases the opportunity for us to make those sales which provides approximately

\$2 million into our annual budget each year from 1 the sale of those license plates. Subject to your questions, we respectfully 3 4 request approval of the Agency's proposals for 2015. 5 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to accept 6 7 the legislative proposals? COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So moved. 8 9 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second? 10 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Second. 11 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Florida law requires the 12 Governor to independently review legislation upon 13 passage. Accordingly, I am abstaining from the 14 vote on this item. The record should reflect my 15 abstention. 16 Any objections or comments with regard to 17 these legislative proposals? 18 (NO RESPONSE). 19 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hearing none, the motion is 20 approved with one abstention. 21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you, 22 Governor. 23 Our final agenda item is Number 5, and it 24 consists of a notice of Proposed Rule 55-12.006, 25 and it concerns residents' contribution to the cost 1 of care.

On June 3rd, 2014, House Bill 5003 became law increasing the amount of income that residents to the state veterans nursing homes may retain for their personal use from \$35 per month to \$105 per month. Residents must contribute the remainder of their income to their maintenance and support while residing in a state veterans nursing home up to the actual cost of operating and maintaining the home.

We respectfully request approval of this proposed rule change.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to approve?

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?

CFO ATWATER: Second.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any objections or any

comments?

(NO RESPONSE).

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hearing none, the motion carries.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: In closing, thank you, Governor Scott, General Bondi, CFO Atwater, and Commissioner Putnam for your untiring support to our state's veterans and the most veteran friendly state in the nation. Thank

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if we might acknowledge that FDLE's visiting with us in June is an appropriate time for us to align all our expectations against the best measures we have and to -- and to visit with the Commissioner at the time and speak to the success at that time, and if there is any action needed to take, that it would be addressed at that time.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. All right. Anything else?
All right.

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GOVERNOR SCOTT: Now I'd like to recognize Mike Prendergast with the Department of Veterans' Affairs. Good morning.

MR. PRENDERGAST: Good morning, Governor Scott,
General Bondi, CFO Atwater, and Commissioner Putnam.

Every day is Hero's Day in the great Sunshine State
with your leadership and fierce dedication to our

American patriots who have made everything that we have
in the United States of America so richly possible for
each and every one of our citizens and today's -today's cabinet meeting has really been a testament to
the hard work that goes on among all of the state
agencies, from the Department of Economic Opportunity
to the Division of Forestry and everything in the
between, that makes possible our ability to say that

Florida is the most veteran-friendly state in the nation, so thank you very much on behalf of our 1.5 million veterans, their family members, and their survivors.

Governor Scott, we have for the cabinet today
three agenda items for your consideration. Agenda Item
1 is the agency's first quarter report for fiscal year
2014 and 2015. We just have a couple of quick
highlights for you in the interest of time. In our
Bureau of Field Services and the Benefits and
Assistance Division led by Alene Tarter, who had to
depart earlier to attend a conference call, we attended
over 200 outreach events during that quarter alone, and
we provided services to 15,000 veterans and their
families whenever they attended those outreach events.

In our Bureau of the State Approving Agency, which helps us ensure that out veterans and our family members and survivors get access to their GI Bill benefits, we actually accredited and approved 3,600 programs through the State Approving Agency, and that marked a 52 percent increase for the agency over the previous quarter -- previous fiscal year's same quarter. Of course, we maintained a 99 percent occupancy rate in our state veterans' nursing homes, and we continue to excel in delivering world class care

by having all six of our state veterans' nursing homes
now ranked at the five-star level.

We respectfully request approval of the first
quarter's report for the agency.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to accept the report?

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there second?

CFO ATWATER: Second.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any objections? Any comments? Hearing none, the motion carries.

MR. PRENDERGAST: Thank you. Agenda Item 2 is the agency's second quarter report for fiscal year '14 and '15. For the second quarter, our Bureau of Veterans' Claims advocated for more than 27,000 veterans and their family members, and part of those efforts resulted in \$29 million in retroactive compensation to our veterans and their family members.

Also, in the second quarter, FDVA began its work with Florida Is For Veterans, Inc., the 501(c)(3) nonprofit that was created as part of the legislative session last year that came into being once we got the appointments made, and as part of that process, the folks at Florida Is For Veterans, Inc., went through and conducted a pretty wide and strategic search, and

they ended up tracking Bobby Carbonell, our former

Director of Legislative and Cabinet Affairs, to go on

and take on the responsibilities and roles as their new

Executive Director.

So with Bobby's departure, we immediately advertised the vacancy in accordance with our established procedures, and after conducting an open, transparent, and highly competitive process to fill an urgent and critical need in the agency and after reviewing more than 57 applications, we found an exceptionally outstanding candidate, who happened to be part of our agency already.

And, Governor, it's someone that you know quite well because she was our key leader for executing all of the Governor's record service award ceremonies over the past calendar year, and that's Captain Colleen Krepstekies, an Operation Iraqi Freedom combat veteran and also a member of our esteemed 53rd Infantry Brigade of the Florida National Guard as a joined guardsman, so we're going to work really hard for this legislative session, but we're looking forward to great contributions form Colleen for all her hard work.

(Applause.)

GOVERNOR SCOTT: She does a great job.

MR. PRENDERGAST: She absolutely does, Governor,

and we're blessed to have her in the agency. Ladies and gentlemen, we respectfully request approval of our second quarter a report.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to accept the report?

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?

CFO ATWATER: Second.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any comments? Any objections? Hearing none, the motion carries.

MR. PRENDERGAST: Thank you, Governor. Agenda

Item 3 is the agency's recommendation for the Florida

Veterans' Hall of Fame Class of 2014. The Florida

Veterans' Hall of Fame recognizes and honors those

military veterans who, through their works and lives,

during or after military service, have made a

significant contribution to the state of Florida

through civic, business, public service, or other

pursuits. It is not a traditional military hall of

fame as it focuses on post military contributions to

the state of Florida and its citizens.

The Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council, an appointed seven-member body, is an advisory panel that is responsible for submitting to the Governor and Cabinet a list of recommended nominees. In selecting

its nominees for submission, the Council gives
preference to veterans who were either born in Florida
or adopted Florida as their home state.

The Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council received a number of nominations from the field, and reviewed each nominee submitted by the general public using established criteria. The Council ranked the nominees and submitted eight recommendations to our agency for possible inclusion in the 2014 Hall of Fame.

Based on the Council's formal nominating criteria and Florida Statutes, the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs is honored to recommend five of the eight names for your approval. The nominees are the late Rear Admiral Leroy Collins, Jr., from Tampa, Florida; Major General James Lee Dozier, United States Army retired; Dr. and Colonel and former Surgeon General of the great state of Florida, Colonel Frank Farmer, who served in Vietnam with the Army and retired from the Air Force as a full Colonel; Chief Master Sergeant Gene Cecil Johnson, United States Air Force retired, and as we observe Black History Month, Chief Johnson will be the first African-American inductee, if so voted today; and finally, Lieutenant General Lawrence F. Snowden, United States Marine Corps retired and a Tallahassee native.

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Moving forward, we will work with your respective offices to schedule a ceremony at the Capitol so that we can formally honor the nominees as they are inducted into the Hall of Fame with their names placed on the wall near the Capitol's rotunda.

Before we proceed, here to speak on Agenda Item 3 is Mr. David McAllister, Sons of Confederate Veterans, Florida Division.

MR. McALLISTER: Good morning, Governor and cabinet members. I'm David McAllister, PO Box 7343, Wesley Chapel, Florida. I advocate for appreciation of history and veterans and especially of the period of the war between the states. I am the Chairman of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, Florida Division, Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Committee. I am here with Mr. H. K. Edgerton, a veteran of the United States Army; former President of the NAACP of Ashville, North Carolina; Chairman Emeritus of the Southern Legal Resource Center; winner of the CSS Hunley Award, named for the famous confederate submarine, which is the highest accolade of the National Sons of Confederate Veterans for his -- which he won for his defense of all southerners' civil rights and the defense of the good name of the confederate veteran.

Honorable Governor, ladies and gentlemen, it would

be a sad day when the Florida cabinet is complicit in breaking Florida law. Failure to act and hopefully to approve all eight of the recommendations of the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council for 2014 violates Florida Statute 265.03. The Director of the Department of Veterans' Affairs has no authority to delay this issue past the calendar year of 2014, nor has he the authority to exclude or include certain Florida veterans and not others arbitrarily and unilaterally.

I'm calling on Attorney General Pam Bondi to investigate these violations of Florida Statute.

Florida Statute Number 1.01, Definitions, defines the term "veteran". The term "veteran" means a person who served in the active military, naval, or air service and who was discharged or released under honorable conditions only, or who later received an upgraded discharge under honorable conditions. That's all. The enabling statute for the Hall of Fame says it is the intent of the legislature to recognize and honor those military veterans who, through their works and lives, during and after military service, have made a significant contribution to the state of Florida.

These are the three men that the Director deems not qualified. The first is Governor and earlier General Edward A. Perry, who led the Florida Brigade at

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the Battle of Chancellorsville; Colonel and later the first Inspector General David Lang, who led the Florida Brigade at Gettysburg; Private and later Sergeant Samuel Pasco, a Harvard graduate who came to Florida, signed up, was wounded at the Battle of Missionary Ridge, became a POW.

Now, Governor Perry, when he was Governor, founded and started the university system in Florida. He also started the Florida Veterans' Pension Plan. Inspector General David Lang is known as the Father of the Florida National Guard. Samuel Pasco, after the war, became a lawyer, was elected to the Florida legislature, Chairman of the Constitutional Convention, was elected by the legislature to be a United States Senator from Florida where he was on the Panama Canal Commission for the nation, and he's the namesake of Pasco County here in the state of Florida.

These are people, men, obviously, certainly, worthy candidates. I ask that you withhold your approval of any veterans for the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame until all veterans can be recognized. The whole world is actually watching Florida. What you do is important way beyond the plaque in the rotunda of the Capitol building. Would you deny Holt Collier or Napoleon Winbush, who is a black confederate and whose

grandson, Nelson Winbush, lives here in Florida and is a member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans? The President, himself, is qualified for full voting membership in the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

Where's the reconciliation in Florida for confederate veterans? Where's the inclusion of their decendents in the diversity of this state? If you believe that it's important that no veteran be left behind and that no veteran is a second-class citizen, then remember this about the message that you send with your vote today. How we treat the veterans of 150 years ago is how the veterans of today will be treated 150 years from now. Thank you very much.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Thank you.

Do you have a question?

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Yes, Governor. No, I don't have a question, but I would ask that the Colonel come up, and if he could, with his general counsel, they are the entity who can address this, the general counsel for Veterans' Affairs.

MR. PRENDERGAST: Thank you, General Bondi,
Governor Scott, CFO Atwater, and Commissioner Putnam.

In fact, it's not a technicality. It's a reality, and
I would like for my general counsel at the Department
of Veterans' Affairs to speak to the essence of the

matter so that we can discuss it in the legal terms
that are appropriate for the statutes of the state and
also to the U.S. Code. Mr. David Herman.

MR. HERMAN: Good afternoon. Thank you. Very briefly, the nomination guidelines for the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame was approved in 2012. They're on the public website. They're the same criteria in effect today as they were when they were approved. The nominees for the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame must meet the following criteria: They must have received an honorable discharge from the United States Armed Forces and provide official documentation verifying discharge status.

Regrettably, three of the nominations that were given to the Executive Director of the Department of Veterans' Affairs did not meet this criteria. They were -- served with the Confederate States of America, not the United States Armed Forces, and no discharge documentation showing their honorable discharge status was provided. Additionally, the nominees must meet the definition of veteran as defined in Section 1.01 of the Florida Statutes. This definition does not reference the Confederate States of America.

Given the failure to meet this criteria, the

Department of Veterans' Affairs had the authority and

responsibility to not advance that recommendation. The Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs appreciates and thanks the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council for their work and their expertise in developing this list of nominees. However, per Florida law, the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council is an advisory council.

They provide recommendations. They submit those

They provide recommendations. They submit those recommendations. Then, as the Council exists within the Department of Veterans' Affairs, they provide that list to the Executive Director, who then makes the recommendations from there to the Governor and Cabinet for a decision. I can answer other questions, if needed.

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I have a question. Are there any inductees in the Veterans' Hall of Fame who served prior to Florida's statehood who were territorial members of our militia?

MR. HERMAN: No, sir.

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: And would they be eligible?

MR. HERMAN: If they meet the criteria, sir.

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: But they wouldn't meet your criteria because they wouldn't have served in the United States Army. They would have served in some militia or territorial militia.

MR. McALLISTER: Amen.

1 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Do the nominees -- when you say "nominees," how many submissions were there? 2 many names were put forward for consideration? 3 MR. HERMAN: There were eight nominees put forward 4 for consideration, sir. 5 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I mean, of the pool of 6 7 people who were considered --GOVERNOR SCOTT: So you -- Commissioner, you're 8 9 saying how many nominees to the commission? COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Yes. 10 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Overall. 11 12 GOVERNOR SCOTT: How many overall nominees? 13 MR. PRENDERGAST: In excess of 50 this year. 14 MR. McALLISTER: About 40, 50 this year. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. Let's -- let's let the 15 16 person at the microphone speak. MR. HERMAN: I beg your pardon. About 50, sir. 17 18 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Okay. So the eight that were put forward went through the same selection 19 20 process. They were evaluated, ranked, compared against the broader pool of 50, and it wasn't until the end of 21 the process that you discovered or interpreted that 22 three should not be eligible. Is that correct? 23 MR. HERMAN: After the list was submitted to the 24 25 Executive Director, sir, we reviewed them.

1 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So you all don't have 2 anybody on the committee? You don't staff the committee? You don't provide administrative support? 3 MR. HERMAN: The Florida Veterans' -- excuse me. 4 The foundation, the Florida Veterans' Foundation staffs 5 the Hall of Fame, sir. 6 7 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Say that one more time. MR. HERMAN: I'm sorry. The Florida Veterans' --8 9 excuse me. The Florida Veterans' Foundation provides staff support for the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame 10 Council. 11 GOVERNOR SCOTT: So if there had been a review of 12 13 the statute at the time, that's who would have done the 14 review? You were -- at that point, you were not asked. 15 Right? 16 MR. HERMAN: Yes, sir, Governor. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. Thank you very much. 17 18 Any other questions? COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I'll be happy to yield, if 19 20 others have questions. Otherwise, I'll --GOVERNOR SCOTT: If you have more, go ahead. 21 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I think you all screwed this 22 23 up. 24 MR. McALLISTER: Amen. Amen. 25 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Sir, you're not helping me.

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We don't need to relitigate the Civil War or the war between the states, whichever camp you come down on.

Kirby Smith is one of our two state honorees in the nation's capitol. Under your logic, we should remove that, and that debate has occurred before. legislature could have that debate again and make a different decision, but it's not -- there clearly have been people pre-statehood who made a difference in our There clearly were people who were part of the state's legal decision to succeed who, at the conclusion of hostilities, rolled their sleeves up and helped make Florida what it has become today. bad, and ugly.

So if you're throwing these guys out on a technicality, that's just dumb, and we don't need to relitigate this. If it needs further clarification by the legislature, I'm not willing to hold up five deserving people to wait on three, but I'm sure irritated that it gets all the way to the Cabinet to relitigate the war between the states in 2015.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. So we have a choice. All right. We can say that we want to -- your legal advice is that we don't have a choice. Right?

MR. HERMAN: Yes, Governor.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. So we have a choice.

We can either say we'll wait, if the legislature wants to come back and amend the existing statute and wait for the Class of 2014, all right, we can not take your advice, or we can approve these five, and then we'll wait and see if the legislature changes the law. Are those the three choices we have?

MR. HERMAN: Yes, Governor.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. Does anybody have any comments or suggestions?

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: One question. Who has ultimate author -- I assume since we're voting on this -- who has ultimate authority to make this decision?

MR. HERMAN: You do, sir, the Governor and Cabinet, sir.

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Well, then I would move that we adopt the five you've put forward and that we provisionally adopt the three, pending clarification from the Florida legislature this legislative session, and then you guys can go to the legislature and defend why you think pre-statehood soldiers who helped make us a state and those who served during the period of hostilities don't deserve to be recognized.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Just -- Governor, may I?

Just so you understand, it has to be pending

1 legislative approval this session to make it legal. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Attorney General, will you say 2 that and explain that one more time? 3 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Well, I see Commissioner 4 Putnam's point, but we have to have it -- we're being 5 told that that's not the law right now. I don't have 6 7 it in front of me. So according to the general counsel, it would have to be pending legislative 8 9 approval. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Right. 10 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: For the three additional 11 members? Sir, for the three additional members, for 12 13 the three, you understand that it would have to be 14 pending legislative approval? 15 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Legislative clarification --16 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Clarification. COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: -- that, in fact, those who 17 18 served prior to 1845 and those who served during the period that the state of Florida was not a part of the 19 20 United States of America would be just as eligible as all others who have served the state of the Florida. 21 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: And I don't think 22 anyone's disagreeing with that, but that's not the law 23 24 as it currently exists, according to the general

counsel. Is that correct?

MR. HERMAN: Yes, Attorney General. ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So we can --GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. Let's go back for a second. ATTORNEY GENERAL: -- approve them pending. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Colonel, can you -- can you give us the background of the three that don't fit within the definition of today so we know what we're voting on? 

MR. PRENDERGAST: I don't have their biographies with me this morning, Governor Scott, but all of the cabinet aides were provided copies of their biographies prior to the cabinet aides meeting last week. The three gentlemen in question are Samuel Pasco, David Lang and Edward Perry.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: May I ask a question?

MR. PRENDERGAST: And they -- their -- their

packets that were submitted did not contain anything

whatsoever indicative of active federal service in the

Armed Forces of the United States of America in

accordance with our statutes and also in accordance

with the nominating guidelines for the Florida

Veterans' Hall of Fame Council, and those guidelines

for the 2014 class remain unchanged for the 2015 class

that is currently advertised out on the street.

1 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: But were they simply just 2 crossed off the list because they didn't qualify statutorily, or you're saying if they qualified 3 statutorily, you still wouldn't have nominated them? 4 think that's the question. 5 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Yeah. You probably didn't make 6 7 that decision because you said they didn't meet the 8 qualifications. 9 MR. PRENDERGAST: They did not meet the initial qualifications. 10 GOVERNOR SCOTT: So why don't we do -- why don't 11 12 we -- I think we're all okay with this. 13 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: He's one of the commissioners who could shed some light on how they 14 made their consideration. 15 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Commissioner Hart --16 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. Can we -- here's my 17 18 biggest concern. I didn't review the other three 19 because I didn't -- they weren't presented. 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Never made it to us. GOVERNOR SCOTT: So I don't -- I don't feel 21 comfortable voting on something I have no -- I'd want 22 to read it first. So it seems to me what we ought to 23 24 do is I think -- I don't think your resolution is a bad 25 idea or your motion's a bad idea, but I'd like to

postpone it to the next meeting, and let's all read their backgrounds and make sure we know what we're approving.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Because they were just automatically disqualified is what I'm understanding, so, Governor, if it's appropriate --

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: That's an important point.

My understanding is they bubbled up to the top and were selected as one of the eight winners. They weren't -- they weren't crossed off at the beginning. They were crossed off after being determined they were among the eight vets.

MR. PRENDERGAST: They were -- they were voted by the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council and forwarded as the eight recommendations for the Class of 2014, and after we received the list, we went through and did our due diligence to ensure that the Council had complied with the Hall of Fame guidelines, but also, we went back to the U.S. Code and reviewed the statutory language in the U.S. Code and as well as Florida Statutes, and we followed Florida Statutes 1.01, but we also went back to Title 38 that talks specifically about definitions of what a veteran is, and Title 38 says that a veteran provide -- means a person who served in the active military, naval, or air

service and who was discharged or released there from under conditions other than dishonorable.

The term "Armed Forces" means the United States
Army, the United States Navy, the United States Marine
Corps, the United States Air Force, and the United
States Coast Guard, including reserve components
thereof. The term "active duty" means full-time duty
in the armed forces, other than duty for training, and
the term "active military" for any of those services
means active duty, that they were activated under the
statutory authority of the United States of America to
serve, and then received a discharge certificate
indicating that they were indeed a veteran.

We have men and women in our National Guard all across this county who have never been activated to serve in support of a Title 10 responsibility, and various states have done a lot of great things to make sure that those men and women are taken care of, appreciated and respected and thanked for their service, but that does not automatically make them eligible for veterans' benefits under Title 38 of the U.S. Code.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Governor, I'd like to review the applications. I haven't had a chance to review them.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Here's -- it seems to me what we ought to do is two things. One, we got to review the applications. That's one. Two, I'd like to have the Attorney General review the -- review the statute and give us your advice.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: I think my general counsel's all over it back there. So, yes, but that's going to take time. We're going to have to look at that and speak with all of these gentlemen, and I'd like to speak with Commissioner Hart also who was on the committee, the selection committee.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Commissioner?

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Governor, I certainly appreciate this good conversation, and I'm going to withdraw my motion that calls for their conditional approval so that everyone can have an opportunity to research this further, but as a policy matter, it's not my view that we should exclude based on the period of time during which they served, and clearly, there's no character or other features about their biography that disqualify them, other than the period of time during which they served their state, or the commission would not have elevated them to the top eight, but everyone should do their due diligence.

So I would withdraw my motion and move that we

approve the five that are put forward and urge the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs, a cabinet agency, to seek legislative clarification that will allow members of the pre-statehood militia and the period of time during the succession to be eligible, given all the other factors, for inclusion -- for consideration into the Hall of Fame.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Commissioner, I want you to think about something, though. If we do it that way, we cannot go back -- we can't go back and include them in this class. Right? I think the law right now is you can only do five. Right?

MR. PRENDERGAST: No. Governor, we can -- the Hall of Fame Council can nominate up to 20 for your consideration.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. So I'm fine with doing the five then, as long as we actually review it and do more, if we want to.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: And let me -- can I clarify with general counsel? So they don't all have to be done -- I haven't read -- they don't have to all be done at the same time. Correct? So if we do five today, could we later add additional ones?

MR. HERMAN: I believe so, Attorney General.

Excuse me. It's hard to hear. The statute says the

department can submit a list of names up to 20, so it's at the discretion of the Governor and Cabinet to choose some, all, or none of that list.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: I don't -- no offense. I just don't feel that that's a solid enough answer right now. Governor, what I would ask currently is that we just withdraw this from today, not defer it, just withdraw it where we have time to look at this entire class because I don't want to mistakenly -- and you presented great names, but there may be additional great names. I don't want to mistakenly add five people and then not be able to come back.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Me either.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So I would just ask at this time, based on the confusion, to withdraw it.

Commissioner Hart is nodding, and then we can still revisit the Class of 2014 honorees, Commissioner

Putnam, because I don't want there to be a loophole in here that could leave people out.

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Okay.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. Commissioner Putnam, are you going to withdraw yours?

COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I'll withdraw my motion.

GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. So we have a motion that we're going to withdraw this.

1 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Withdraw. 2 GOVERNOR SCOTT: What the plan is we're going to bring it back after you have the opportunity to review 3 it, after we have the opportunity to review all of 4 the -- at least all the eight. 5 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: And we may -- it sounds 6 7 like we do need legislative clarification, and we may be able to -- I have to look at the law and see if we 8 9 can approve additional members conditionally, you know, upon legislative clarification. 10 Gentleman, you want to do this the right way, and 11 12 that's what we're all trying to do, the general 13 counsel, the Colonel, everyone here, Commissioner Hart, 14 so we want do this in -- and with the proper decorum 15 and respect. 16 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. There's a motion. Is there a second? 17 18 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Second. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any comments or objections? 19 20 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Wasn't it your motion? ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Oh, I thought it was your 21 motion. 22 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. It's the Attorney 23 General's motion. 24 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I'll second her motion. 25

1 GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. So any comments or objections? 2 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Just one question for the 3 general counsel because I don't want to -- I don't want 4 to cause confusion with the Class of 2014. There's no 5 time frame on this. Right? We're okay. We're already 6 7 in 2015. We're okay? Sir, please -- please have proper decorum. 8 trying to help you. Okay? You're military. You 9 should understand this. 10 MR. HERMAN: No, ma'am. I believe there's not a 11 specific limitation. 12 13 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Okay. So that helps you. 14 All right. Thank you. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Okay. So the motion we're doing, 15 16 just to make sure everybody knows, we're withdrawing this issue, but the plan is we're going to review it. 17 18 You're going to give us your advice on -- sorry -- on the law, and then we'll review those additional 19 20 candidates, and we'll come back, hopefully next meeting. 21 22 All right. All in favor aye? 23 (Unanimous ayes.) 24 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Opposed? 25 (None.)

1 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Motion carries. 2 MR. PRENDERGAST: Thank you, Governor and Cabinet. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Next, we have John Steverson with 3 the Department of Environmental Protection. 4 MR. STEVERSON: Good afternoon, Governor and 5 Cabinet. There are three items on the Board of 6 7 Trustees' agenda. I will be as quick as I possibly 8 can, but if you could grant me -- grant me one moment 9 of latitude, I would like to mention that Operation Outdoor Freedom events, those hunts are fantastic. 10 Where I just recently came from, the Northwest Florida 11 Water Management District, we'll be holding our third 12 13 annual hunt this year. We got that going with the help of Commissioner Putnam's office and Executive Director 14 Nick Wiley, and I plan to be there skinning deer first 15 16 thing Saturday morning. I invite you to come by. It's just a great chance to give back just a little bit to 17 18 those who gave so much. Our first item is submittal of the minutes of the 19 20 November 12th and December 9th cabinet meetings. GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to approve this 21 item? 22 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved. 23 24 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second? 25 CFO ATWATER: Second.
