4 5	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Next, we have Mike Prendergast	
6	with the Department of Veterans Affairs.	
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Good afternoon,	
8	Governor Scott, General Bondi, CFO Atwater, and	
9	Commissioner Putnam.	
10	It's an honor to stand before you today and brief	
11	you on the matters of import within the Department of	
12	Veterans' Affairs.	
13	The Department of Veterans' Affairs has four	
14	agenda items for your consideration today. Agenda Item 1 consists of the minutes from the	
15	May 5, 2015, Cabinet meeting, and we respectfully	
16	request approval of those minutes.	
17	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion on the item?	
18	ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved.	

19		
20	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?	
21	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Second.	
22	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Moved and seconded. Show the	
23	minutes approved without objection.	
	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Agenda item 2 is	
24	the Agency's fourth quarter report for fiscal year	
25	2014/2015, and I would like to briefly provide a	
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1	couple of highlights from that report with you.	
2	Beginning with our Homes Program Division, as	
3	presented in the last Cabinet in May, the design for	
4	the future State Veterans' Nursing Home Number 7,	
5	Ardie R. Copas State Veterans' Nursing Home, will be	
6	following the guidelines as directed by the federal VA	
7	community living centers requirement.	
8	To-date, we continue to make significant progress	
9	on the plans for construction of the home by formally	
10	obtaining a property upon which the home will be	
11	built, securing the approval of the land use plan and	
12	completion of preliminary design. Now that we're in	
13	the new budget year, our next step is to get approval	
14	from the newest department of Veterans' Affairs for	
15	the 35 percent design of the project's plan.	
16	This is a phased process for the VA, approving	
15	the 35 percent design of the project's plan.	

approximately 50 percent, 75 percent, and then 100 percent of the design plans.

Most importantly, the 35 percent benchmark is when funds are released to the state so we can continue on with the process to build the Ardie R. Copas home. Once completed, we anticipate that this home, based on the new community living center model, will employ approximately 170 FTEs, with an occupancy capacity of 128 veteran residence.

Turning now specifically into the homes division itself, overall our homes occupancy trends continue to hover around 98 percent to 99 percent and they're greatly outpacing the private sector which hovers around 87 percent. To continue to better serve our Veterans and our staff, we are also in the process of requisitioning a grant to obtain to safety lift systems thought all of the nursing homes, to be able to more safely and efficiently transfer residents to and from their beds to their wheelchairs and to other mobility devices, while reducing the risk of injury to our residents but also reducing the risk of injury to our staff.

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14	Depending on the acquisitional process, we	
15	anticipate to begin receiving the funds for the	
16	systems by the end of this calendar year. And once	
17	the funds are received, we'll work with the experts in	
18	health care field to assess each home, to identify the	
19	best methods of installation within each of our	
20	facilities.	
21	Turning to our Benefits and Assistance Division.	
22	Our claims examiners have advocated for more than	
23	40,000 veterans and their families during the last	
24	quarter, and at the same time they received and have	
25	reviewed including the processing of nearly 10,000	
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9		141
1	claims for Disability benefits. Overall dollars and	

claims for Disability benefits. Overall dollars and retroactive compensation for the year total more than

\$134 million to our state Veterans.

The Division also assisted nearly 134,000 that walked through the Agency's doors or other venues and conducted 742 outreach visits for veterans during the fiscal year that just ended. Field services and other staff also supported 181 outreach events, including Veteran service ceremony awards for the quarter that just concluded. They disseminated information to more than 10,000 Veterans and families during these events.

12	Finally, the Division also conducted statutory	
13	mandatory certification courses that allow our county	
14	Veterans Service Offices to continue to assist with	
15	the processing of claims for Veterans and their family	
16	members at or across the state.	
17	We respectfully request approval of the Agency's	
18	quarterly report.	
19	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to accept the	
20	report?	
21	ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So moved.	
22	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?	
23	CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER ATWATER: Second.	
24	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Any comments or objections?	
25	Hearing none, the motion carries.	
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1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you.	
2	Agenda Item 3 is the Agency's legislative budget	
3	request for fiscal year 2016/2017. The FDBA LBR	
4	request follow the goals of the Executive Office of	
5	the Governor's Long Range Program Plan, and aligns	
6	with the components of the Governor's Keep Working	
7	budget. The LBR has 18 items on a summary spreadsheet	
8	that's been provided to you and in addition we have	

9	provided detailed back-up information to the staff of	
10	each of your respective offices.	
11	Overall, the LBR requests an approximate 10	
12	percent increase in our budget authority over the	
13	2015-2016 budget. Approximately 80 percent of that	
14	comes from our state Veterans' Trust Found money, and	
15	approximately 20 percent comes from general revenue	
16	appropriations. Our LBR items seek to improve the	
17	health, safety and welfare of Florida's Veteran	
18	community as well as those who serve our Veteran	
19	community across the state. It reinforces the mission	
20	to make Florida a global destination for jobs and	
21	families while strengthening Florida communities.	
22	We have briefed staff previously and we will	
23	continue to meet with staff over the coming weeks	
24	including a meeting with the Office of Program and	
25	Budget and the Governor's staff in about two weeks to	
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1	go into greater detail.	
2	In summary, the Agency is requesting	
3	69-and-a-half FTEs to meet new requirements and	
4	increase work load across the Agency, and our	
5	approximate request. The request totals roughly \$26.2	
6	million with an approximate split of 56 percent coming	

7	from non-recurring dollars and 54 percent coming from
8	recurring dollars.
9	Do you have any questions at this time, Governor?
10	GOVERNOR SCOTT: I don't. I'm not going to vote
11	on it, because I have to do a budget separately, so is
12	there a motion on the item?
13	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I have some questions,
14	Governor.
15	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Commissioner?
16	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: You're asking for 70 new
17	employees?
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: 69.5.
19	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: How many employees do you
20	have now?
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Eleven hundred
22	and twelve.
23	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: And how many of the new
24	employees are anticipated because of the new nursing
25	home?
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1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: That's a great
2	question. We expect 170 employees for Ardie R. Copas
3	Veterans Nursing Home, whenever it does come on the

4	line. But due to the increased nature of the	
5	requirements to support the Veterans that are	
6	residents in our home today, our work load factors	
7	have increased. For example, World War II and Korean	
8	War Veterans had medical issues that were much lower	
9	state of requirements than the Vietnam Veteran	
10	residents that we are treating and taking care of in	
11	our state nursing homes today.	
12	There are claims issues that I think they present	
13	to the agency whenever they file. Their claims are	
14	100 percent greater, on average, than what the World	
15	War II and Korean War requirements were. So the	
16	complexity of their medical issues has necessitated a	
17	demand on services that requires more hands-on	
18	expertise from our nursing staff in our respective	
19	nursing homes. And that totals approximately I think	
20	it's 41 41 additional assets to support just the	
21	homes division.	
22	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So that on the	
23	administrative side to manage the claims, or is that a	
24	physical nursing assistance to the resident?	
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: That is all	
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direct care assets in the homes.

2	In addition, because of the increased work load
3	for our Benefits and Assistance Division, we're asking
4	for additional claims examiners to deploy out in to
5	the field, because we have folks who present
6	themselves every day at our facilities across the
7	state and we cannot physically get to all of them
8	because of their complex nature of their claims and
9	the issues of when they bring their medical records
10	in.
11	The average number of Veterans medical records
12	when they present is much thicker than a notebook like
13	this, even for a one or two term enlisted soldier or
14	young commission officer who separates. And those
15	Veterans have a four-fold-to-ten-fold manifest
16	requirement of additional issues over the World War II
17	and the Korean War Veterans, whenever they come
18	through the doors. So the average time to process a
19	claim for one of those Veterans is much, much greater
20	than the claims that present for World War II and
21	Korean War Veterans. The reason for that, as you well
22	know, Commissioner Putnam, is because of the chronic
23	cycle of deployment, come back for a brief period of
24	time, train, and go right back on another employment.
25	The other thing that we're facing now is we know

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1	the Army is going to draw down approximately 50,000
2	active duty troops over the next two years, if
3	Congress approves that. And with that additional work
4	load that's going to come out, we will have more of
5	those Veterans that are presenting themselves at our
6	doors to help them process their claims and get them
7	into the pipe line for VA healthcare and other
8	services and benefits.
9	But right now today, we cannot meet the demand
10	that presents at our doors on a daily basis to provide
11	benefits and assistance counseling to the Veterans.
12	We don't have enough assets to cover all of the VA
13	outpatient clinics and the medical centers that are
14	out there, and the VA continues to open new facilities
15	at a rate of about two per year in the Sunshine State.
16	And so, we're trying to catch up to that demand today
17	so we can take care of those Veterans much earlier and
18	there's not a backlog for services at the state level,
19	which is a challenge that we want to try and avoid for
20	our Veteran community.
21	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Let me shift gears to the
22	nuncing homos Numbon 7 is Conas Was this fully

23	funded for construction last year by the Legislature?	
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: What we needed	
25	to continue the construction process was provided for,

1	you're correct.	
2	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So you have got a request	
3	this year to finish Copas?	
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: We're not asking	
5	for all of the money upfront because it's a phased	
6	process. We're asking for the money to keep Copas on	
7	track and construction and all of the planning phase	
8	requirements to stay on track for that one.	
9	We've also additionally requested authority to	
10	proceed forward on Home Number 8 and Home Number 9,	
11	which Governor Scott had included in his budget	
12	request that was presented to the Legislature for the	
13	2015 Legislature Session. The Legislature did not	
14	take up either one of the nursing home requests.	
15	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Is there authority for Home	
16	Number 8 and Home Number 9?	
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: No. That's part	
18	of the process, Commissioner Putnam, and we're asking	
19	for the authority.	
20	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I'm not just talking about	

21	budget authority. Has the Legislature approved	
22	statutorily a 9th nursing home that needs to then be	
23	funded?	
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: The way we've	
25	worked this is that we the Governor provides the	
9		148
1	letter to the US Department of Veterans' Affairs, as	
2	the Governor of this state, soliciting their support	
3	to support the construction of nursing homes. We	
4	actually have on the US Department of Veterans'	
5	Affairs Secretary's desk the letters for Home Number	
6	8, Home Number 9 and Home Number 10, the request for	
7	the matching grant funds to construct those homes.	
8	We have not gone specifically back to the	
9	Legislature and asked the Legislature to the approve	
10	us proceeding forward on that. That's part of the	
11	legislative budget request that we've assembled and	
12	that Governor Scott had in his budget that he proposed	
13	for with the 2015 session.	
14	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: And the site selection for	
15	Number 8, the criteria for that site, will that come	
16	back to that for approval before you bring us the	
17	site?	

18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Yes, it will,	
19	Commissioner Putnam.	
20	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So what in your mind is the	
21	road map for 9, if we haven't even picked a site yet	
22	for 8? Do you anticipate picking a site for 8 and 9	
23	at the same time?	
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: We believe that	
25	would be a prudent process for us to work our way	
9		149
1	through, as was done in the past when we built the	
2	nursing home in Panama City and Port Charlotte. We	
3	constructed two simultaneously back then, and if I	
4	remember correctly, the home in Land'0'Lakes and	
5	Pembroke Pines were also constructed nearly	
6	simultaneously; if my memory is correct, they were	
7	pretty close to one another.	
8	As you know, our assessed requirement in Florida,	
9	based on the analytics provided by the Department of	
10	Veterans' Affairs, is that the state should have 4,049	
11	beds for residents in the Sunshine State. Right now	
12	we presently have 870 beds, and the Ardie R. Copas	
13	will add another 128. So, we're moving along and	
14	moving forward on 8 and 9 based on the acuity	
15	requirements that we know we're seeing already in our	

16	Vietnam population, which numbers one out of every	
17	three Veterans in the state of Florida. We're moving	
18	prudently to build the capacity in the agency to	
19	support those needs.	
20	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: But I'm just saying, based	
21	on our experience of picking a site for Copas, it's a	
22	big policy call about what that site selection	
23	criteria is, and it's also a big policy decision	
24	whether you pick number one and number two sites as	
25	Nursing Home 8 and 9, or whether you go through that	
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1	selection process again. Because some may choose to	
2	bid based on who the last winner was, that would then	
3	reflect where the gaps are geographically around the	
4	state.	
5	So I think it's because of the sensitive	
6	nature of that policy call, I think that site	
7	selection criteria should come before us before you	
8	bring us those sites for both 8 and 9, and I think	
9	it's a policy call whether it's simultaneous or two	
10	site selection processes. Does that make sense?	
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: It does.	
12	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: And that's just my opinion.	

13	There's three others who have a vote here, but that's	
14	and we live and we learn, and I think that's kind	
15	of the take-aways I have on site selection number 7.	
16	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Do you want to make a motion on	
17	it? Or do you want to make a specific motion?	
18	Because I think what you said makes sense.	
19	So let me make sure I get this right. So the	
20	Legislature has got to fund the state portion. They	
21	didn't fund the state portion for 8 and 9 last years,	
22	so we don't know if they're going to fund it this	
23	year?	
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Correct.	
25	GOVERNOR SCOTT: But you're putting it in your	
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1	budget recs, and we'll decide whether we'll put it in	
2	our budget rec. So you put it in your budget recs,	
3	the state founding for 8 and 9?	
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Correct,	
5	Governor.	
6	GOVERNOR SCOTT: So and we'll find out what the	
7	Legislature does. The Commissioner is recommending	
8	that you come back with a proposal on the process to	
9	even or the locations to come back and tell us	
10	where they would like them and what the criteria is	

going to be before we -- but there's no reason to do

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12	it before the legislative process and get the money.	
13	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Correct. I don't think I	
14	can	
15	ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: It's not is my	
16	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I don't think I can make	
17	that motion. But the other important factor here, I	
18	think, is Legislature will have an opinion on this as	
19	well and they had legislation last Session, it did not	
20	pass, but I would expect it will be back. So that may	
21	that certainly has the ability to trump this entire	
22	conversation, but in the absence of that direction	
23	from the Legislature, you've heard what my preference	
24	would be, and we may choose to agenda at a later time	
25	to take official action.	
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1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Commissioner	132
2	Putnam, one thing we would like to do at a future	
3	Cabinet meeting as well is come back to you and	
4	provide the results of a public workshop that we had	

on the site selection process that we conducted in

including the Governor's recommended process to move

February in anticipation of legislation passing,

8	forward on 8 and 9. We had that ready to go, but	
9	unfortunately, the Legislature didn't pick up 8 and 9	
10	at their processes this year.	
11	So, we'll come back before the end of the year	
12	and present the findings of that public workshop, and	
13	then from there, you may have other questions that we	
14	want to do and hold a separate public workshop to	
15	mature the process further to prepare us for some of	
16	those potential opportunities in the future.	
17	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Thank you, Colonel. I think	
18	it's a good deal what the Commissioner is saying that	
19	you ought to come back at the appropriate time and we	
20	vote on what the process should be and the criteria.	
21	But I guess we can't do anything about that today.	
22	Is there any questions on the legislative budget	
23	request?	
24	CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER ATWATER: I'll make a	
25	motion.	
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1	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?	
2	ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Second.	
3	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Florida requires me to	
4	independently submit a budget proposal, so I'm going	

5

to abstain from the vote.

6	Any comments or objections?	
7	Hearing none, the motion is approved with one	
8	abstention.	
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you,	
10	Governor. We have one additional agenda item for you,	
11	and that's our legislative proposals for 2016.	
12	This year, much of the focus is on our	
13	legislative budget request, of course; however, we see	
14	an opportunity to work on additional license plate	
15	initiatives, which provide a significant revenue	
16	stream to keep the costs low and our State Veterans	
17	Nursing Homes to the tune of a couple million dollars	
18	per year. They go into our trust fund to help us	
19	operate our homes at zero general revenue	
20	appropriations.	
21	So we could like to include expansion of our gold	
22	star plates and select motorcycle plates to folks,	
23	like myself and Al Carter and his wife who ride	
24	motorcycles, and many other Veterans across the state	
25	as well. That did not make it into the process last	
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	year, but there is a demand among our Veteran	
1		
2	residents who would like to see more specific of	

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3	license plates to support their desires to reflect
4	their service pride and the medals and decoration that
5	they might have earned.
6	So we'll also look at one other issue that's come
7	up from our Veterans service organizations from the
8	Florida Veterans Council, and that's to exempt
9	Veterans who are able to drive but have
10	upper-extremity impairments from having to pay to pass
11	through the tolls. This is a huge driving safety
12	issue, and we have a number of Veterans who would like
13	to receive this exemption benefit. And it's a small
14	group; we'll be able to come back to the Legislature
15	in weeks ahead and report back to them what exactly
16	what we anticipate what the costs will be.
17	But for the moment, that's what we have for our
18	legislative proposals for our 2016 Legislative
19	Session, and we respectfully request approval of
20	those.
21	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So we're approving all
22	but (inaudible.)
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Say that again,
24	Commissioner?
25	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So we would be approving

1	only the in-state tuition for dependents using the GI
2	Bill, the Veterans Employment Opportunity Act, and the
3	license plates; we would not be approving the disabled
4	Veterans home because we don't that's not ready
5	yet, you said.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: We have already
7	done the in-state tuition for the family members of
8	our Veterans. That was passed this last time around.
9	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Okay, so the plates are the
10	only part
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: The plates are
12	the only thing we're working on this year for a policy
13	proposal.
14	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Veteran toll is not ready
15	for us to approve prove yet? The Veterans disabled
16	toll charge?
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: No, it is not.
18	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So it will not be a
19	proposal, or it's not ready for us to approve?
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: It's not ready
21	for you to approve.
22	ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: I thought that was in
23	the proposal, though; it's not? Okay.
24	GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. Is there a motion?

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1	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?	
2	CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER ATWATER: Second.	
3	GOVERNOR SCOTT: Florida law requires me to	
4	independently review the legislation upon passage, so	
5	I'm going to abstain.	
6	Any comments or objections? Hearing none, the	
7	motion is approved with one abstention.	
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PRENDERGAST: Thank you,	
9	Governor.	
10	In closing, I would like to thank you on behalf	
11	of Florida's nearly 1.6 million Veterans, their family	
12	members and survivors. Our families in Florida that	
13	come from the Veteran community are truly blessed to	
14	have your leadership and your care and concern out	
15	there fighting for them and their families each and	
16	every day.	
17	Thank you for what you do for Florida Veterans.
