#### FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS FIRST QUARTER REPORT July 1 – September 30, 2019

This report covers the activities of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs (FDVA) for the First Quarter of the 2019-2020 Fiscal Year.

#### 1) Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs Administrative Highlights

#### a) Current Issues/Concerns

#### i) Executive Direction:

Executive Director Danny Burgess appointed Retired U.S. Navy Senior Chief Bob Asztalos as the chair of the Florida Veterans Foundation.

FDVA partnered with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and Crisis Center of Tampa Bay to highlight our state's veteran suicide prevention efforts during Florida Veteran Suicide Prevention Week, September 8-14. A proclamation from Governor Ron DeSantis was released as part of the observance. A joint editorial signed by the leadership of FDVA, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VISN 8) and the Crisis Center of Tampa Bay garnered positive statewide coverage in most of the state's major newspapers.

FDVA monitored Hurricane Dorian for its potential impact on Florida's veteran population, to include its network of State Veterans' Homes and Medical Centers of VA Outpatient Clinics. Messaging was shared with our state and federal counterparts. We've reached out to our State Department of Veterans' Affairs counterparts in Georgia and the Carolinas to offer support, as necessary.

The Governor's Initiative on Lawyers Assisting Warriors (GI LAW) program connected more than 60 active duty Florida service members with pro bono (no charge) civil legal services since the initiative began in March 2019. Seven different statewide law firms represent service members pro bono through the GI LAW program. GI LAW staff trained and granted statewide program access to Judge Advocate General's (JAG) Corps legal offices of the U.S. Navy, U.S. Air Force and U.S. Coast Guard. Further, U.S. Marine Corps and U.S. Army JAG Corps units are scheduled for GI LAW training in the near future.

#### ❖ Veterans Education and Awareness

FDVA has completed the regional assessment phase of the *Forward March* veterans' advocacy campaign. FDVA Executive Director Burgess had launched the *Forward March* initiative on March 29 at the University of South Florida (USF) in Tampa. The *Forward March* initiative was announced by Governor DeSantis to bring together the combined energy and resources of our state agencies, Veterans' Service Organizations, private partners and local community providers to ensure Florida is providing the very best services and support for our veterans and their families. FDVA hosted seven *Forward March* regional summits in Pensacola, Jacksonville, West Palm Beach, Ocala, Miami, Port Canaveral and Sarasota. Feedback was gathered from the regional summits to identify actionable veterans' related issues. FDVA will issue a report of its findings and recommendations to the Governor and Cabinet.

#### Community Outreach

FDVA coordinated cinema advertising and social media campaign featuring a 30-second FDVA-produced health care recruitment public service announcement aired in all markets with a State Veterans' Home. Our goal was to reduce the number of health care professional vacancies at our State Veterans' Homes in Panama City, Lake City, St. Augustine, Daytona Beach, Pembroke Pines, Port Charlotte and Land O' Lakes. The campaign continued through August 11.

Nielsen TV ratings were released on July 12. More than 215,000 households in Florida watched the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) special, "National Memorial Day Concert," which aired live in all nine PBS markets in Florida on the evening of Sunday, May 26. It cost us a little more than two cents per household to have our public service announcement run before the opening titles. Our continued sponsorship of new veteran-related programming on PBS is garnering us great results for our investment.

FDVA signed a contract with *Quest Corporation of America* on September 27 to produce a new public service announcement (PSA) to help connect veterans with their earned services, benefits and support.

FDVA also has conducted visits with local health care and mental health facilities related to alternative therapies and treatment options for veterans.

Executive Director Burgess provided a list of sixteen Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame inductees for approval to the Governor and Cabinet at the September 24 Cabinet meeting. The Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame inductees are being honored for their significant contributions to the communities, businesses, and public within the state of Florida. The Executive Director also provided an update to the Governor and Cabinet on two new State Veterans' Nursing Homes and the Clifford C. Sims State Veterans' Nursing Home in Panama City regarding its post-hurricane Michael roof replacement project.

Further, the Executive Director Burgess met with the Governor's Office of Policy and Budget (OPB) and with legislators regarding veteran-related bills. During the meetings, he proposed best practices for veterans' initiative to improve benefit access for Florida's veterans and their family members. He also addressed top financial issues that could impact Florida veterans' resources and programs.

#### ii) Division of Veterans' Benefits and Assistance:

#### 1. Bureau of Veterans' Claims Services:

Claims Service's First Quarter production review of rating decisions remained steady. Seaman Donald "Don" Stout assumed duties as the new Division Director of Veterans' Benefits and Assistance. Director Stout has a wealth of experience with FDVA, County Veterans' Service Offices and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. In September, former Director of Veterans' Benefits of Assistance Sergeant Alene Tarter retired after 20 years of dedicated and honorable service to FDVA. The agency will sorely miss her guidance and leadership.

The Bureau of Claims Services advocated for 27,773 veterans and their families, with 15,023 rating decision review of claims for disability benefits completed through the Veterans Benefits Management System (VBMS). Bureau of Claims represented 493 veterans before the Board of Veterans Appeals (BVA) to uphold their appellate rights for veterans' benefits.

Additionally, the Bureau represented 95 local Personal Hearings with the St. Petersburg VA Regional Office. We continued to mitigate the majority of these local issues to the advantage of the veteran prior to the hearing date. As always, we continue to stand ready to meet the increasing demands of veterans' appeals requirements.

#### 2. Bureau of Veterans' Field Services:

The Bureau of Field Services advocated for 72,112 veterans and their families, while conducting 300 outreach events, providing earned benefit information to 9,061 veterans and their families. Field Services also completed 12,303 disability claims. In addition, Field Services attended nine Homeless Stand Down events, 29 Transition Assistance Briefings to file disability claims during those presentations, and 62 New Patient Orientations in VA Medical Centers and VA Outpatient Clinics.

Field Services' supervisors assisted the Bureau of Veterans' Claims by reviewing and entering 401 rating decisions. Field Services also assisted more than 1,768 veterans related to voter registration.

# 3. The Bureau of State Approving Agency (SAA) for Veterans' Education and Training:

orientations and briefings on state, federal and local veterans' laws and benefits.

The SAA operates under contract with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to review, audit, evaluate, approve and oversee school and training facilities that participate in GI Bill® Education Benefit programs. Therefore, SAA performance goals are based on the Federal government calendar year (October 1 through September 30).

Overall, SAA met established federal goals for Fiscal Year 2019 (Federal Fiscal Year). The annual contract between FDVA and VA was renewed for Fiscal Year 2020. FDVA officials are extremely pleased with the outcome, especially knowing that VA did not offer the Fiscal Year 2020 SAA contract to the state of California.

The Harry W. Colmery Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2017 (Forever GI Bill®) ushered in 34 changes which impacted VA Education Benefits. Due to the inability to integrate with VA computer systems, VA has been unable to implement one of the most significant changes. The monthly housing allowance payment to U.S. Code Title 38 Chapter 33 beneficiaries based on the location of the campus where the individual takes the majority of



classes. Using a revised strategy, VA tasked the SAAs to perform approval actions of Branch and Extension campuses, rather than creating a zip code determiner. The SAA submitted approximately 600 additional campus approvals to VA this quarter. VA's new "Go-Live date" for compliance with the requirement of Section 107 of the Colmery Veterans Education Act 2017 is December 1, 2019.

The Veterans Benefits and Transition Act of 2018 also greatly impacted SAA performance this quarter. One of the components of the law, which created U.S. Code Title 38 § 3679(e) prevents all schools from assessing financial or access penalties to Chapter 31 (Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment program) and Chapter 33 (Post 9/11 Veterans Benefits) beneficiaries for up to 90 days, while the institution awaits payment from VA. All Florida schools had to demonstrate to the SAA, their adopted compliance with this new law by August 1, 2019.

- (1) Outreach Activities are any activity designed to inform or encourage those with entitlement to use it. SAA contact with non-approved schools and training facilities, inviting them to apply for approval to participate in GI Bill® programs, also are considered outreach.

#### iii) Division of State Veterans' Homes:

Delayed onset Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) has typically been observed among the elderly, who may develop PTSD stemming the development of symptoms after exposure to single or multiple traumatic events. PTSD can characterize differently between persons. Some people may predominately notice they do not enjoy the things they used to, or feel dissatisfied or indifferent about their life. Others may experience behavioral symptoms and/or a fear-based re-experiencing of the traumatic event. More symptoms include experiencing negative thoughts, avoidance, or becoming unnecessarily reactive to stimuli.

Veterans at State Veterans' Homes, who experience symptoms of PTSD, can gain from music therapy as a treatment option to improve functioning and foster resilience. In addition, findings suggest that music therapy is effective in reducing depression symptoms and improving health-related quality of life. Music therapy has been employed as a therapeutic intervention to facilitate healing across a variety of clinical populations. Emotions are produced by music and can be used intentionally to help regulate the resident by planning with the resident/family to



have a list of songs that increases his or her mood. This can be used as a positive distraction technique during a crisis.

This music therapy is in addition to standard treatment to address symptoms for PTSD. For example, it will be used as a way to build rapport and allow the residents to express himself or herself nonverbally since some of our residents with PTSD have a difficult time talking about the trauma. Music can help prompt memories when a resident is unable to reprocess a memory due to not remembering it. It can also be used as a tool to ground the client because music can prompt feelings of calmness. Music gives our resident something to focus on in the here-and-now so the veteran can remember that he/she is in a safe place. The State Veterans' Homes using music therapy with residents to help them to express themselves and their emotions in words. Music in a group setting can reduce isolation and feelings of detachment, and increase pleasurable emotions.

Music therapy is a useful therapeutic tool to reduce symptoms and improve functioning among residents with trauma exposure and PTSD. In addition, music therapy may help foster resilience and engage individuals who struggle with stigma associated with seeking professional help.

State Veterans' Homes is working to provide MP3 players to all our resident veterans. The activity staff is assisting them to download books, music, old-time radio programs, and most importantly, providing carefully selected eight hours long sleep music to help fall asleep to our veteran residents, who are suffering from PTSD.

State Veterans' Nursing Homes continue to be the long-term leaders in providing the most extraordinary programs that produce the highest quality of health care for our Florida veterans.

#### **Veteran Agriculture Selection Program (VASP)**

In September, we started a final round of veterans starting internships at the University of Florida, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences Research and Education Centers. As many of the current internships wrap up, we continue to place veterans in private internships at farms and ranches as well as aggressively pursue post-internship employment opportunities that align with the veteran's interests and skills. To date, all the veterans who have completed the internship have been placed into agriculture-related positions.

#### **Development**

Boeing granted us \$55,000 for career services support initiatives to veterans. This is an increase of \$5,000 over the previous year's amount. We are pursuing a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) grant, known as a 2501 grant for outreach to veteran farmers and ranchers in order for them to gain better access to USDA programs and available funds. USDA was supposed to notify us in September; however, there are no status updates from USDA on our application.

#### **Board of Directors Meeting**

State Representative Mel Ponder, Northwest Florida State College President Dr. Devin Stevenson, and CareerSource Okaloosa Veteran Employment Specialist Neely Jo Harrington joined the Board of Directors meeting at the Northwest Florida State College in Niceville on September 10. The next scheduled Board of Directors teleconference is on October 4, 2019. The meeting will be focused on Entrepreneurship Network partners to consider additional contracts from prospective partners.





#### 4) Florida Veterans Foundation (FVF)

In 2008, the Florida Legislature established the Florida Veterans Foundation (FVF) as a Direct Support Organization of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs. The Foundation operates for the direct and indirect benefit of the veterans of Florida, the FDVA and state veteran service organizations (VSO). FVF is also a nonprofit organization operating for charitable and educational purposes under Section 501(c) (3).

FVF seeks out the greatest unmet needs of Florida veterans and works proactively and collaboratively with state veteran service organizations to solve issues that impede their progress, such as employment, housing, transportation and benefits assistance.

We welcome the inspirational leadership of Chairman Bob Asztalos, who was appointed to his position this summer. He is very optimistic about the future through his creative ideas on securing recurring funding. The following initiatives will affect veterans in a positive productive manner.

#### Fundraising

Through the creativity of current leadership, there is an excitement of raising money to support veterans emergency relief, transportation and collaboration with life-saving programs relating to Crisis Center partnerships and support of USF Alternative Treatment for Veterans with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and Opioid addiction.

#### Trilogy Partnership

FVF is contracting with Trilogy Integrated Resources, Network of Care for veterans and military service members.

#### ❖ Forward March

The Florida Veterans Foundation led the way through district networking to support FDVA with the Governor announced initiative *Forward March*. To date, the FVF has been in lock step with FDVA in making this program viable. FVF continues to stand ready to assist FDVA in execution of taking "ideas to action!"

#### Kenan Family Trust Grant

The grant provide support to veterans' outreach and education program. The program makes it possible for veterans to remain for longer periods of time in their own homes for their health and welfare. The grant was awarded for \$300,000 in partnership with the National Association of Veterans and Families (NAVF).

#### Attorney General Veterans Literacy Grant

FVF has completed the Attorney General's Veterans Literacy Grant in the amount of \$250,000. The benefit of Aid and Attendance, Pension and Disability claims helps connect veterans with Federal VA funding, thereby freeing up State Medicaid money. Another bi-product is of this outreach that for every 800 veterans registered with the VA, the state earns an additional of five federally funded medical professionals.

#### Suicide Prevention, Opioid, Mental Health Services



FVF collaborated with the Tampa Bay area's 2-1-1 Crisis Center to provide support for a targeted statewide campaign that will connect the veteran population to service providers at all levels regarding issues such as Suicide Prevention, Opioid Abuse, PTSD, and Mental Health Treatment.

#### ❖ Veteran Treatment Court

The Veterans Treatment Court (VTC) statewide committee, Rehabilitation vs. Incarceration supports the veterans suffering from PTSD and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) from roadside bombs and suicide bombers Improvised Explosive Devices. The FVF has been connecting VTC's throughout the state to one common thread for effective, shared best practices.

#### Homeless Veterans Stand Down

FVF is currently in development of best practices of Homeless and At-Risk Veteran Stand Downs through the *Forward March* Initiative. FVF is working to build county models to serve homeless and at-risk veterans to develop a program of a day of service for effective, meaningful support, which will allow greater resources for year-round service.

#### Chartered Functions and Success

FVF's direct support of FDVA is "proactive" to ensure success of military personnel prior to discharge. We are producing needs assessments to create roadmaps for new veterans to educate them on their journey from cradle to grave. FVF is becoming the "Systems Management" of the statewide processes to support the Florida veterans.

- During the First Quarter, FVF provided financial support to 124 veterans through the American Legion's project Vet Relief.
- Supported Disabled American Veterans (DAV) to arrange transport for veterans to medical appointments. This quarter FVF served 4,713 veterans to medical and other appointments.
- FVF and District Directors connected 286,713 veterans and families through personal contact and media.
- FVF collaborated with American Patriot Service Corp (APSC) and National Association of Veterans & Families (NAVF) to conduct 43 Aging Veterans Presentations.
- FVF served 12,342 veterans through Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) for education and benefits.
- FVF provided support to over 3,000 veterans through Bay County Veterans Council for the education of benefits and services in Hurricane-affected area.
- Supported the publication of the Florida Veterans' Benefits Guide.
- Provided financial and administrative support to the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council
  and Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame.
